With 144 participants, it was international participation. Twenty countries were represented by The Thirteenth Annual Conference of the Association was held in Austria, Bulgaria,

The conference opened on the evening of 4 April with a reception given by the Director of the School of Oriental and African Studies. The meetings were all held in the auditorium of SOAS and most meals were taken in the refectory of College Hall, a hall of residence near to SOAS where most participants were housed. The conference was divided into sessions which covered linguistics, literature, music, history, archaeology, folklore, and economics. The first session each morning was a special lecture, each of which proved to be enormously interesting. Dr. D. Bouchez spoke on "Studies on Kim Man-jung - Looking Back" (5 April), Dr. Ch'oe Pyöng-hön spoke on "Roryö sidae Tosön-tip'ungsu chiri-söl kwa kön'guk inyöm" (6 April), and Prof. Gary Ledyard gave an absorbing slide lecture "The Last Battle of the Imjin Wars: Scenes from a Painting" (7 April).

Some of the best discussions took place informally after the paper sessions at the refectory or at night. In the opinion of all participants, this had been an enormously successful conference.

It is a reflection of the competent preparations which were made that the conference went off without any major or minor problems. The Association again wishes to express its sincere gratitude to the conference organisers and to the Korea Research Foundation which provided generous assistance to support the conference.

The President, Prof. André Fabre opened the meeting and asked for a moment of silence on behalf of the late Albert Schmid, a founding member of the Association, and for Gregory Henderson and Kim Sungha, friends of Korean Studies in North America.

Brief reports were made on the following subjects:

- a) The festschrift for Prof. W. E. Skillend: Dr. D. Bouchez reported that the index for the volume was not yet ready, but it was anticipated that the book would be in print within two months
- b) Festschrifts for Drs. D. Bouchez and Li Ogg: A joint festschrift or two individual festschrifts were proposed by Prof. A. Fabre.
- c) Euroreader: Prof. André Fabre reported that attempts to find a publisher for the Euroreader have failed. He will continue to search for a publisher. If anyone knows of a potential publisher, they are asked to contact Prof. Fabre.
- d) Union Catalogue of Periodicals: Mr. A. M. Olof reported that the work had not yet been completed, but he hoped that following a third journey to check on material, it would be possible to have the catalogue out quickly.
- Dr. B.C.A. Walraven, the Treasurer, reported that the Association had no outstanding debts or deficits. He reminded members, however, that the extra money to publish the proposed festschrift(s) would have to come from the Association's own funds. The same comment, of course, would apply to the funds to publish the Union Catalogue of Periodicals.
- Dr. M. Deuchler reported on the preparations for the conference. The size of this conference meant that there had been more work than at any previous conference. She reminded members that if they had not heard from the conference organizers about arrangements and invitations it was the responsibility of the membership to contact the organisers. The scale of the conference meant that it was not possible for the organisers to check to see that all invitations had been received.
- The Newsletter Editor reported that 800 copies of the Newsletter had been printed this year and that over 650 copies had been distributed to date.
- Prof. W. E. Skillend reviewed the proposals to change the Constitution of the Association as they were stated in Newsletter 12. The membership passed the changes as they were submitted. (The revised Constitution appears in a separate section).
- Dr. R. Huszcza reported on the 1990 conference which is to be held in Warsaw from 19 to 23 April. He could not promise as large a conference as the 1989 conference, but felt that 100 persons could be accommodated. Details will be included in the first announcement which will be sent out in the early summer.

The site of the 1991 conference was not yet set. The conference would most likely take place in France at either Bordeaux or Lyon. Seoul was also proposed as a venue.

Several participants announced from the floor details about

yarious conferences of Oriental or Korean Studies to be held in Osaka, New York, P'yŏngyang, and Toronto. (Further particulars of some of these conferences are to be found in the General Information section).

Dr. J. H. Grayson, Convenor of the British Korea Library Group, raised the possibility of organising a similar co-ordinating group within Europe. (A more detailed suggestion is contained in the General Information section).

On behalf of the membership, Prof. D. Eikemeier thanked Prof. W. E. Skillend, Dr. M. Deuchler, and Dr. Pak Young-sook for their efforts in organising the 1989 conference.

Prof. André Fabre, the President of the Association, reminded members that when they attended other conferences they attended only in the capacity as members of the Association and not as delegates or representatives of the Association.

## SUMMARIES OF THE 1989 CONFERENCE PAPERS

BDITOR'S NOTE: The following summaries are essentially the work of the individuals concerned. The McCune-Reischauer transcription system has been used throughout, except in the case of preferred spellings of personal names. There are also a few editorial alterations in the text of the summaries themselves. These papers are not referred to again in the Reports of Studies Related to Korea. Please note that for a summary to be included in this section it must be in one of the three official European languages recognized by the Association.

Pentti Aslto (University of Helsinki)

"The Middle Korean Tones and the Altaic Theory"

The author refers to parallels in certain Germanic dialects and wanted to make credible that the Middle Korean tones resulted from the loss of a second syllable of originally disyllabic (Altaic) words. Thus a monosyllabic Middle Korean word with the two-point tone mark would correspond to a disyllabic stem with an open second syllable, while a monosyllabic with the one-point tone mark would reflect a disyllabic with a closed final syllable. On the other hand, the material in Ramstedt's etymological dictionary shows few correspondences with the Middle Korean vocabulary treated by Rosén.

V.D. Atknin (Leningrad)

"Korean as an Object of Comparative Studies"

i. The problem actually is to what language or to what language group Korean is genetically related. At present, we may find at least ten hypotheses concerning the genetical relationship of Korean, among these are 1) Korean as an isolated language, 2) Korean vs. Dravidian, 3) Korean vs. Japanese, 4. Korean vs. Malayo-Polynesian, 5) Korean vs. Gilyak, 6) Korean vs. Indo-European, 7) Korean vs. Manchu-Tungus, 8) Korean vs. Altaic, 9) Korean vs. Boreal (as a member of the Altaic family, and 10) Korean vs. Nostratic (as a member of the Altaic family).

ii. Sine qua non is accepted: one should not begin with the comparison of languages. The comparison should be done only after the history of each compared language is well studied. From this point of view the state of Altaic Studies is rather disappointing. Those researchers who do comparative studies of the Korean language, very often use data from the modern Korean language, and compare it with Middle Mongolian and dialectical Tungus.

iii. The paper deals with the basic methods of comparative studies which can be applied to the problem of Korean and the present state of this field. Principal attention is paid to distinguishing the borrowings in the languages compared, which seems to be the first and foremost problem in comparative studies, revealing casual coincidences, and descriptive words.

iv. Common difficulties impeding comparative considerations of Altaic languages were also examined.

Iuliy Bantchev (Bulgarian Academy of Sciences, Sofia)

This paper suggested that the rapid externalization process of economic performance and technological development of South Korea in the 1880's is closely connected with the emergence of the information paradigm which changed the pattern of international financing of technology transfer. The internal and external aspects of this externalization process in South Korea are explored in their narrow, and first and foremost in their broader sense. It is argued, that the new fields of technological localization and the main trends in the liberalization process of the economic performance are the decisive domestic ingredients of the internalization process of the korean economy. Furthermore, the close connection between the rapidly increasing domestic R & D activities and the contemporary externalized mode of equity flows (chiefly direct foreign investment) is examined. Some key areas of correlation between the future externalization process of structural economic development and the degree of informationization of the Korean society are identified at the end of this paper.

Jonathan W. Best (Wesleyan University, Connecticut, U.S.A:)

"The Miruk-sa of Paekche"

The ruins of the Mirŭk-sa or the temple of Maitreya, are located in Iksan (Chölla pukto) some thirty-five kilometers south-southeast of Puyŏ, the site of the last capital of Paekche. According to the Samguk yusa, King Mu of Paekche (r.600-41) ordered the Mirŭk-sa raised at the place where three images of Maitreya miraculously appeared before him and his queen. The recently completed archaeological exploration of this site by the Samguk yusa's statement that the great temple encompassed three parallel but distinct ritual precincts, each containing its own pagoda and icon hall. The Samguk yusa also indicates that the three icon halls were meant to correspond to the three grand assemblies for religious instruction that Maitreya, the next Buddha to appear on earth, will hold during his promised incarnation. This textual evidence provides a compelling is structures at the Mirūk-sa, a ground plan that is unique among known East Asian Buddhist temples.

The problem remains, however, as to why not only the Miruk-sa but also several other major Packche temples were built in the Iksan area and at such a distance from the royal capital. An answer to this question is suggested!) by reference to passages

from Buddhist sutras detailing Maitreya's future earthly career and 2) by consideration of another record concerning King Mu's Iksan temple building activities that has been preserved in a section of the Kuan-shih-yen ying-yen chi dating to the early T'ang period. In the first instance, the standard scriptural descriptions of Maitreya's final incarnation agree that he will be born to the family of a high official in the service of a mighty world-conquering king, a true cakrayartin. In the second instance, the Kuan-shih-yen ying-yen chi mentions that in preparation for relocating his capital King Mu built a great Buddhist temple, the Chesök-chongsa or Temple of Indra at the proposed site for his new metropolis. Modern archaeology has located the ruins of the Chesök-chongsa in Iksan, not far from the Mirūk-sa.

Thus, it would seem that in endeavouring to move the Paekche capital to the Iksan area King Mu attempted to actualize architecturally the iconography of Maitreya's incarnation and thereby "magically" to assure that Paekche - as had been intimated by the earlier miraculous manifestation of the three Maitreya images - would be the location of that sacred event. The benefit to the kingdom, and to its ruler, would be more than enduring religious fame. Since the sutras specified that Maitreya would be born in the realm of a true cakrayartin, Paekche would necessarily become that all-conquering state, an especially alluring vision during the bitter struggles for peninsular hegemony that characterized the late Three Kingdoms period.

Karoly Fendler (Hungarian Institute of International Relations, Budapest)

"Sources from the Austro-Hungarian Monarchy on the Modern History of Korea (1885-1912)"  $\,$ 

on 23 June, 1892, the Austro-Hungarian monarchy and Korea signed the "Agreement of Friendship, Trade, and Navigation". The interest of the Monarchy and the Hungarian public in Korea dates even earlier. Vienna and Budapest reserved political interests and pronounced an "active neutrality" as regards the affairs of the Far East which ehabled it to follow the events and relations there mainly as an observer. The Monarchy's embassy in Tokyo gave regular accounts of Korea's internal and foreign policy events and of the Great Powers' Korean policy. As a result of that interest and familiarity with local political affairs, I have found about 250 reports in the Monarchy's archives, running to 1700-1800 pages, from the period of 1885 to 1912. Some less well-known or even unknown documents have also come to light, dealing with the relationship between Korea and Japan and between Korea and the Great Powers at the turn of the century.

Ambassador Zaluski, for example, showed a keen interest in the stormy developments in the internal affairs of 1884-5 and the race of the Great Powers for Korea. His successor Count Condenhove devoted great attention to the "Korean Revolution" (Tonghak Movement) in 1894-5, to the deepening conflict between Japan and China. Some of his reports dealt with the assassination of Kim Ok-kyun, and its political background. Ambassador Condenhove knew Kim Ok-kyun personally. He also gave a detailed account of the assassination of Queen Min.

In these sources, the analyses and findings about Korea's independence and autonomy deserve special attention. The value of those reports is particularly significant in terms of domestic and foreign policies. The issue in those days -just as now -revolved around the renewal of Korean society and Korea's future place in the world at large.

Hungarian travel books of those days forcibly reveal the interest and sympathy the Hungarian public showed towards Korea and the Korean people.

The centenary of the Friendship Agreement offers a good opportunity to commemorate the hundred years of Hungarian-Korean relations.

Ingeborg Göthel (Humboldt-Universität, Berlin, DDR)
"Modern Korean Painting: How It Began" (Slide Lecture)

My slide lecture showed a selection of paintings by Ko Vidong , Kim Kwan-ho, Sǒ Chin-tal, Im Kun-hong, Na Hye-sŏk, Im Yong-nyŏn, Paek Nam-sun, Yi Chong-u, Chu Kyŏng, Kim Hwan-gi, Yi

In-song, Kim Chung-hyon, Pak Su-gun, O Chi-ho, and Yi Chung-sop to demonstrate that since the beginning of the twentieth century, modern Korean painters have been producing splendid independent works of art which were new in content and rich in form. This was mainly due to the direct and indirect links that they maintained with the Paris art scene, and to the influence that was exercised on them by the Expressionists. Modern Korean artists presented a own and modern view of people, depicting self-confident men and young women and painting them in the nude. Searching for new ways of reflecting their rapidly changing social environment, they began making abstract paintings in 1923.

Quite a number of early modern Korean painters relied on national motifs, which they treated in a great variety of ways. Since they made their works in the era of Japanese colonial rule, they produced pieces that were not limited to mere artistry. They chose both Korean and foreign motifs to demonstrate their openmindedness. Their high artistic standards ensured them a lasting place in art history.

Ivana Gruberová (Prague)

"The Representation of Family, Calendar Customs and Festivals in the <a href="Sosol Genre">Sosol Genre</a>"

The theme of my paper is the representation of family, calendar customs and festivals in the sosol and their importance in the Korean mediaeval prose. I have tried to generalize the results of my research of the subject based on some representative works of this genre. I have chosen Kumo sinhwa, Hong Kil-dong chon, Sassi namjong-gi, Kulun-mong, Tokki-jon, Changin, Hungbo-jon, Sim Ch'ong ka, Changhwa hongnyon-jon, Ch'unhyang-jon, and Inhyon wanghu-jon for this analysis. The research shows which of the customs and festivals were explicitly mentioned or implicitly present in the sosol.

The most popular calendar festival in these <u>sosol</u> was ch'ilsok. In mediaeval Korean literature it was considered to be the festival of love. Spring festivals of flowers were very popular, too. Besides the mention of festivals there are some allusions to the seasons in the <u>sosol</u>. Various events of a story are situated in definite season that is specified by exact temporal data or by a small detail of nature. Such detail seems to be a conventional symbol. The manner of depicting the beauty of nature is also interesting. While the spring or autumn sceneries were depicted often, the scenes of culminating summer or winter were nearly always omitted. Since the hero was a "black and white" one, the nature which surrounded him was also either blooming or withering. The theme of changes in nature is replaced by the arrangement of constant attributes for the four seasons, for instance the Weeping Willow (podùlnamu) and peach and plum blossoms (tori-hwa) for spring.

If some references to calendar customs and festivals in the  $\frac{\log 2}{\log 2}$  can be considered to be elements outside the story, the same cannot be said about the representation of family customs and festivals. In the  $\frac{\log 2}{\log 2}$ , we can trace a chief character from birth to death. The  $\frac{\log 2}{\log 2}$  can be called the hub of an

individual's life as well as of the family's life. The most frequently mentioned family customs in <a href="mailto:so87">so87</a>] were l) the wedding ritual (<a href="mailto:hollye">hollye</a>), the mourning rites (<a href="mailto:sangnye">sand the ancestral sacrifices (<a href="mailto:cherve">cherve</a>). Divergences 'from the Confucian codex were not welcome. In spite of this fact, some variations in the scheme can be found in the <a href="mailto:sos81">sos81</a>, which depend on a character's emotions. To study how much the behaviour of these heroes differs from the fixed norms is to find out the degree of individualization. This individualization can be considered to be the moving power of the development from the mediaeval Korean literature towards modern literature.

The representation of traditional customs in the sosil has been simplified like the description of other events taking place in the highly normative Korean prose. These novels cannot become a source of an autonomous ethnographical research unlike some works of European literature of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries or modern Korean literature. Nevertheless, the kodae sosil remain as a source of important information about the culture of the Koreans.

JaHyun Kim Haboush (University of Illinois-Urbana, U.S.A.)

"Seventeenth Century Korean Views of State and Civilization"

The rites controversies of 1674 and 1679 were examined. The new international situation in East Asia stemming from the fall of the Ming dynasty and the rise of the "barbarian" Ch'ing dynasty required a re-evaluation of many fundamental issues in the Korean court. The Sõin and the Namin differed in their views concerning the definition of civilization, of how best to continue it, on the duty of the Korean monarchy in this civilising mission and the relationship between the monarch and the bureaucracy and their respective roles. The rites controversy was an expression of the Korean quest for a new role in the changed world order.

Gabriel Jonsson (University of Stockholm)

"Trade and Economic Development - Korean Perspectives"

South Korea is generally regarded as one of the most successful examples of a development strategy based on export promotion. World trade is characterized by the developed countries' (DCs) export of manufactured products and the less developed countries' (LDCs) export of primary products. The latter's share of world trade has decreased since 1950 while the former's share has increased. However, South Korea is one of the few LDCs whose share of world trade has increased since 1950.

Following the devastation of the Korean War, emphasis in economic policy was put on reconstruction. Trade had a low priority in economic policy and reflected the typical composition of an LDC. The high rate of inflation and import restrictions encouraged a policy of import substitution of non-durable consumer goods. This policy, however, reached its limits due to

the limited size of the domestic market. However, the initial conditions for economic growth were very favourable. Internally, there were a number of well-educated people and the level of industrialization was higher than in other LDCs. Externally, world trade in manufactured goods was expanding rapidly and there were no major trade barriers.

Economic development was given priority following the military coup led by Pak Chông-hùi in 1961. Comprehensive five-year economic development plans were established. Because of the small size of the domestic market and the lack of natural resources, South Korea decided to maximize economic growth by promoting exports of light, labour-intensive manufactured goods to the DCs. Emphasis in economic policy had changed from reconstruction to growth maximization. The only domestic resource to base this development strategy upon was the huge supply of cheap labour. Exports began to increase and contributed substantially to the high rate of economic growth in the 1960's. However, the expansion of domestic demand also had a positive effect on economic growth.

In the 1970's, changes in relative factor-prices led to a change of exports from labour-intensive to capital-intensive manufactures. Huge investments were made in heavy industry, which caused a premature loss of competitiveness in light industry. However, these investments also led to a more sophisticated export structure. The export structure has changed in favour of capital-intensive since the 1970's.

During the 1980's, trade has continued to contribute to economic growth. South Korea showed an economic growth rate of 8.4% between 1962 and 1984, which was one of the highest during this period. During the 1980's, the economy has been liberalized. Efforts have been put on developing more advanced industries and imports have been liberalized. In contrast to previous years, the current account has been positive since 1986. This has made it more important than ever to expand domestic demand in order to reduce the contribution of exports to economic growth.

Zdenka Klöslová (Prague)

"The Theatre of the New School (Sinp'a) in the 1920-30's"

The Theatre of the New School (Sinp's) is one of the two main streams of modern Korean theatre. Its rise at the beginning of the twentieth century was initiated by the Japanese Theatre of the New School (Shimpa in Japanese). The Korean Sinp's dominated the Korean stage until the beginnings of the 1950's, enjoying as much popularity as the commercial theatre.

The development of the Korean Sin'pa can be divided into three stages. The first stage covers the second decade of the twentieth century. Unlike the Japanese Shimpa, the Korean Sinp'a was not related to any oppositionist anti-government movement. The second stage falls in the 1920's when it was called the Reformed Sinp'a or Kaeryang sinp'a. Instead of adaptations of Japanese plays, plays reflecting life in Korea were staged, absurd elements in the development of their plots were

eliminated, and the plays became closer to reality. The Reformed Sinp'a influenced even some dramatists writing plays according to the principles of the New Drama  $\langle \sin 'g \underline{u}k \rangle$ , such as Kim Chongjin. The third stage in the 1930's was the golden age of the Sinp'a Theatre. Its centre became the Tongyang kukjang. The repertoire consisted of sentimental melodramas which corresponded to the policy of the Tongyang kukjang – to squeeze out tears from the audience.

One of the main features of the Sinp'a plays is their heavy sentimentality. The heroines are kisaengs or poor girls left by their mothers or sold to save their families. In some plays, heroines are virtuous women of the middle class. The low social status of the heroines together with their virtue and will to bear any sacrifice evokes sympathy. Though suffering from many vicissitudes, they never protest against their fate. The ending moves the audience to tears, either over the happy ending with virtue triumphant or over the great suffering of the heroine.

The Sinp'a Theatre of the 1930's enjoyed much more popularity than Sin'guk. One of the main reasons for it was the low intellectual level of the general public. Sinp'a provided a certain kind of consolation for the audience. The conception of the Sinp'a Theatre to present the heroes resigning to any protest against reality met the interests of Japanese colonial policy. Being harmless to the Japanese the Sinp'a Theatre was able to survive the whole period of Japanese colonial rule.

# B.C. Koh (University of Illinois-Chicago, U.S.A.)

The persistence and intensity of the conflict between North and South Korea can be illuminated by the aid of selected concepts and propositions generated by conflict research. Of particular relevance are such concepts as "cognitive consistency", cognitive closure", and "self-fulfilling prophecy". These mechanisms help explain not only the misperceptions in the heads of decision-makers in Seoul and P'yōngyang alike but also their inability to recognize them, let alone rectify them. Perceptions of threats to security illustrate how the psychological mechanisms operate.

civil war have endured with remarkable tenacity. To be sure, evidence of continuing hostility was available in abundance, fueling both distrust and anxiety. When signs of a posssible change in the adversary's intentions appeared, they were either dismissed as a mirage or taken with a grain of salt. Although signs of change began to appear since July, 1988, the recent deterioration of inter-Korean relations in the wake of the controversy over the Rev. Mun Ikhwan's visit to North Korean auggests that cognitive closure continues to hamper inter-Korean relations. A complex of problems is connected with a linguistic source study. In may publication of 1979, I made an effort to give a textological and palaeographic analysis of the HCh based on existing publications. Now Korean scholars who have the original texts of the HCh must carry out a thorough textological investigation of the several variants and editions of the HCh.

To prove the authenticity of the HCh texts, it is necessary to carry out a palaeographic analysis of the texts of the <u>Haerye-bon</u> (with commentary in <u>hannun</u>) and the <u>Onhae-bon</u> (commentary in Korean). Traditional problems concerned with the creation of the Korean alphabet such as the motives underlying its introduction, the process of its elaboration, its authorship and date are not yet solved. The literature on these problems is full of conjectures. The language of <u>Haerye-bon</u> has not been studied completely. It is necessary to study the ways of teaching the Korean alphabet among the court circle and the common people.

We need to have a detailed investigation into the history of each variant of the HCh, its preservation and restoration. There are three types of editions of HCh texts: 1) a corrected scholarly facsimile edition of the text of the <u>Haerye-bon</u> where all the defects (including tonal and punctuation marks) must be corrected, 2) a critical edition of the HCh text with <u>onhae</u> (to reconstruct the lost archetype), and 3) a new edition of an adequate translation of the HCh text with commentary (<u>Haerye-bon</u>) into modern Korean and other languages.

# "Classification of Auxiliary Words in the Korean Language"

In contrast to significant words (words with lexical meaning), auxiliary words 1) do not have a denotative function, 2) can not be a part of a sentence, 3) are used only in

combinations with significant words expressing their grammatical meanings. The auxiliary words of Korean differ by their origin, their morphological features and the grammatical meanings which they express. Some of them have been borrowed from Chinese, other words are indigenous. Since an auxiliary word in Korean is used to express grammatical meanings of other words, the relationships of word combinations and clauses, the most logical and optimal classification would take into account the type of the grammatical meaning expressed by an auxiliary word. Semantical and morphological features are considered as secondary and additional. Among the auxiliary words which may be distinguished are the following types: 1) numeral words, 4) auxiliary verbs and adjectives, 5) link-verbs, 6) modal nouns, 7) particles and 8) substantivizers.

Halina Ogarek-Czoj (University of Warsaw)

"Ch'oe In-ho and His Novels"

Ch'oe In-ho, born in Seoul in 17 October, 1945, graduated from Yonsei University in 1972, with a bachelor's degree in English literature. He belongs to the post-Liberation generation, referred to as the Han'g\(\tilde{U}\) I generation of Korean writers. He, as other Koreans born in the late 1930's and early 1940's, could begin his schooling in his own language, could develop freely his imagination, and, consequently, he could strive for recognition as a writer.

From the very beginning he was praised for his skill in using vivid language. He has published more than twenty books, has written over forty short stories and over a dozen fiction works. He has worked as a playwright and a film director. He used to serialize his novels in the newspapers. Just after publishing serially in the Choson ilbo, "The Home of the Stars", he gained a reputation as a popular writer. Several times he competed for Yi

Sang's literary prize and received it in 1977, 1978, 1979, and 1982.

The themes of Ch'oe In-ho's novels varied very from stories on the renowned kisseng Hwang Chini, full of eroticism and lyricism, through mysterious stories about ties uniting the human world with the other world (such as "The Hymn of the Spirit"), up to the short story "Another Man's Room" which presents an anonymous city-dweller alienated completely from society.

"Some Experiences in Teaching Hungarian Pronunciation to Korean Students"

One of the sources of difficulties in the learning of Hungarian for Korean students is the great difference between the sound system of the two languages. Hungarian vocalism consists of morphtongs only. The length of Korean vowels is not phonemic and is not indicated in Korean spelling as it is in Hungarian. "The Story of Chok Song-ui and the Jataka 'The Friend of Evil'"

Several traditional Korean prose works have alien plots. Among them there are Buddhist stories, such as "The Story of Chok Song-ui". Chok Songui-jon follows the plot of the jataka "The Friend of Evil", at certain points changing certain details.

1) The Characters' Names: in the Korean version, the hero's name is Sŏng-ŭi, the villain's Hyang-ui. I believe these names are the result of the misreading of the Chinese characters for their names. Sŏn-u (Friend of Goodness) became Sŏng-ŭi, Ag-u (Friend of Evil) became Hyang-ŭi.

 The Title: It states the name of the hero who completed the cycle of sorrows, showed his unusual abilites and received his reward.

 The Place of Action: This was not the Indian city of Varanasi, but Anp'yong in Ch'ungnam Province.

4) Changes in the Textual Narrative: The reasons for finding

the pearl were different in the jataka (for the happiness of everyone) and in the novel (to rescue the hero's mother). Song-ui offering of his life for his mother's health represents the Confucian model of the devoted son. All the changes in the Buddhist plot have been caused by the laws of the Korean vernacular novel. The jataka never forgets the final aim and ultimate sense of the deed, the pearl bringing prosperity to the people. The novel is interested mostly in the hero's personal fate and tells us about his way towards order and well-being for which the deed is necessary. That is why it stresses the deed and the reward. The pearl is no more needed after it finds its way to the hero's mother and cures her. The state and its people flourish only due to Song-ui's following the model for Confucian behaviour, and not because the pearl has been found. The Korean novel follows ideas dissimilar to those of the jataka. The Buddhist sermon on goodness towards all living creatures and forgiveness of one's bitter enemies has been replaced by the idea of devotion to the hero's parents and punishment for those who destroy harmony. John Whitman (Cornell University, New York State, U.S.A.)

"Comparative Consequences of the Reconstruction of Proto-Korean Accent"

This paper argued that the accentuation of stems in protoKorean was determined by the voice quality of the stem-final
segment. Stem final syllables ending in a voiced segment received
high pitch; all other syllables were low. This hypothesis is
based on certain insights of Y.C. Chong, but contrasts with the
recently published theories of S.R. Ramsey and S.O. Lee. The
structural rationale for this hypothesis is that it enables us to
reconstruct stems with both open and closed final syllables,
where obstruent finals may be either voiced or voiceless. The
phonetic rationale is based on 1) the fact that Middle Korean
nominal and verbal suffixes for the most part attach with high
pitch, 2) a sharp rise in pitch on the nucleus following a
voiceless obstruent is an unmarked percept across languages. Both
1) and 2) are maintained in a system where the mora preceding a
voiceless stem final obstruent receives low pitch.

If correct, this hypothesis has important consequences for the comparative study of Korean and other languages, because it predicts that at an earlier stage, Korean had a distinction between voiced and voiceless obstruents in stem final position. The paper explores data from Chinese loans and alleged cognates from Manchu and Japanese to test this prediction, and finds some support for it.

Following the 1989 annual meeting of the British Association for Korean Studies, the annual meeting of the Korea Library Group was hosted by the Library of the University of Durham on the afternoon of 22 March, 1989. Dr. James H. Grayson convened the meeting. Present were Dr. Gina Barnes (Cambridge), Dr. Raghu Char (Library, Durham), Ms Fiona Harrison (Library, Sheffield), Mr. G.H. Healey (Sheffield), Dr. Keith Howard (Durham), Ms Jane Irisa (British Library, Boston Spa), Ms Beth McKillop (British Library, Oriental Collections), Mr. O Kyŏng-muk (Library, Sheffield), Rev. Dr. Kevin O'Rourke (Kyŏnghǔi), Dr. R.C. Provine (Durham), and Ms Pamela Stewart (Newcastle). Discussion of the state of catalogue computerization at the several institutions represented was conducted, and a report was given of various developments over the past year at each institution. The possibility of creating a central endowment for book purchase on Korean subjects as exists for Japanese Studies was discussed. It was suggested that the KRF might be approached about a fund to purchase expensive Korean-language materials. Dr. Deuchler and Dr. Pak presented papers entitled respectively "Class and Gender in Eighteenth Century Korea" and "The Royal Academy of Painting: Subject Matter and Style".

5. Dr. Pak and Dr. Deuchler have given several lectures in the new Sotheby-SOAS course on "The Arts of Japan and Korea". This joint venture by a commercial company which is one of the most important in the field of oriental art and a college with academic expertise on the Far East proved to be immediately successful and stimulating. A three-month long intensive course of lectures and seminars leads to an examination for a SOAS of lectures and seminars. The course attracted over thirty certificate in Oriental art. 6. With the retirement of Prof. Skillend, Dr. Deuchler has been appointed Chairman of the Centre for Korean Studies from 1 october, 1989. The academic staff in Korean Studies at SOAS will increase rather dramatically to six persons by the session 1990-91. This will provide the opportunity to offer degree courses with Korean as the major subject. Korean will then be able to combine with those disciplines in which SOAS already has expertise on Korea: history, art and archaeology, linguistics and phonetics, and economics. The combinations with Chinese and Japanese will continue, with the difference that it will be possible for Korean to be the major language taken. Further subjects likely to be added later are religious studies, social anthropology, and possibly geography. The increase in staff can be expected to lead to an expansion of the postgraduate programme, and to a much wider range of supervision for PhD degrees in Korean studies.

7. The Centre for Korean Studies sponsored three seminars this year: Lee, Song Mu (Academy of Korean Studies, Songnam, ROK), "The Korean Examination System and Its Characteristics"; Kevin O'Rourke (Kyŏnghňi University, Sŏul), "The Tradition of Korean Poetry"; Revd. 8. The working time of the Centre for Korean Studies was almost totally absorbed for the session 1988-89 with the organization of the 1989 AKSE conference, at which 144 persons attended. The Association again wishes to thank the staff of the Centre for their efforts in presenting such a successful conference, the largest and perhaps most significant held to date.

A result of the sister relationship between Sheffield and Yonsei universities, the conferences are intended to increase mutual understanding about the contemporary social, economic and political scene in Korea and Britain amongst scholars from each of these countries. Prof. Ahn, Byung Joon (Yonsei) spoke on "Democratic Reforms and Politics in Korean"; Dr. Brian Bridges (RIIA) on "British Foreign Policy and East Asian Security"; Prof. Chung, Chang Young (Yonsei) on "The Korean Economy in the 1990's"; Prof. Andrew Gamble (Sheffield) on "Continuity and Change in British Politics"; Mr. Stephen George (Sheffield) on "Nationalism Liberalism and the National Interest: Britain and the European Community", Prof. Jung Ku-Hyun (Yonsei) on "International Operations of Korean Enterprises"; Prof. Kim, Dalchoong (Yonsei) on "Korean Foreign Policy and East Asian Security Issues in the 1990's"; Prof. Kim Hwang-Joe (Yonsei) on "The Korean Labour Movement: Present Status and Perspectives"; Prof. Brian McCormick (Sheffield) on "Industrial Relations and the Labour Market under Mrs Thatcher"; Prof. Park, Heung Soo (Yonsei) on "Social Changes in Korea"; and Prof. Roy Wilkinson (Sheffield) on "The British Economy Before and After Thatcher".

## Institute for Korean Studies

1. James H. Grayson reports that in addition to teaching the Korean language, he designed and taught two optional seminars of 20 weeks each, one on "An Introduction to Korean History" and the other on "An Introduction to Korean Culture". From the academic session 1989-90, these seminars will form part of the examinable material for Korean Studies as a First University Examination Subject. He gave two lectures, one at the Faculty of Oriental Studies, University of Cambridge, "The Cultural Impact of the Transmission of Buddhism to Korea", and the other at the May, 1989 meeting of the Yorkshire and Northumbria Korea Seminar, "Korean Buddhist Pilgrims in Central Asia and India (6th to 8th

centuries)".

- 2. In January, Miss Cho Hyön-sön of Yonsei University Korean Language Institute came to join the staff of the Institute for Korean Studies for one year to teach Korean language. She succeeds Mrs. Hong Kyöng-p'yo who returned to Yonsei after one year in Sheffield.
- 3. Mr. O Kyŏng-muk of the Central Library at Yonsei University returned to Korea in April, 1989 after a year's secondment to the library of the Institute. During his stay, the cataloguing of the collection of over 7,000 items was virtually completed.
- 4. The Faculty of Social Sciences of the University appointed Dr. Ruth H. Grayson, an economic historian with a specialization in industrialization and rural/urban migration, as an Honorary Lecturer in the Institute of Korean Studies from October, 1989.
- 5. Miss Pack In-son of the Korean Language Institute of Yonsei University was appointed to serve at Sheffield for the academic year 1989-90. She plans to arrive in September and will join Miss Cho for the first term.
- 6. Korean language was offered as a First University Examination Subject for the first time in the academic year 1988-89. Twelve students took First Level Korean this year, of whom nine came from the Centre for Japanese Studies, and one each from the School of Modern Languages, the Department of Politics and the Department of Chemistry. There were six students doing Second Level Korean and two in Third Level Korean.
- 7. Jane Guaschi (Dual Honours in Japanese and Economic and Social History) and Deborah Morgan (Dual Honours in Japanese and Sociology) took the Final Examination in Korean. They are now both in Korea at the Korean Language Institute of Yonsei University for one year to further their study of the Korean language and knowledge of Korean Studies.
- 8. Mrs. Inok Paek Howard was appointed for the academic year 1988-89 as a Teaching Fellow at the Institute. Over the past year, she has made a substantial contributions to the seminars on Korean history and culture, and has conducted two weekly workshops of ten weeks each during the Third Term on Korean music and Korean art. She and her husband gave a concert and workshop on traditional Korean music on 2 February at a programme sponsored by the Institute and the Department of Music at the University. Her Fellowship has been renewed for the academic year 1989-90.
- 9. Mrs. Dong-sook Shin Gills was appointed as a Research Fellow at the Institute and began MPhil/PhD studies jointly with the Institute and the Department of Sociological Studies. Her topic will be related to the urban migration of rural women.
- 10. In co-operation with the Asia-Pacific Business Services Unit of the University, Dr. James H. Grayson, Dr. Ruth H. Grayson (Honorary Lecturer in the Institute for Korean Studies), Mrs Inok Paek-Howard, Miss Cho Hyŏn-sŏn and other members of the Institute designed and carried out commercial training programmes for Unilever (one week) and Michelin Tyre (three weeks). Dr. James

Grayson acted as consultant for the translation of the BBC documentary on the Korean church, "Tongues of Fire" which was part of the series "Sword and Spirit" aired in the Spring of 1989.

11. On behalf of the British Library Document Supply Centre and the University Library, Dr. James H. Grayson taught a "Technical Course in Korean for Librarians" from 3 to 7 July, 1989.

12. Dr. Kevin O'Rourke (Kyŏnghŭi University) gave a seminar at the Institute on 25 May, 1989 entitled "English, Irish and French Influences on Modern Korean Poetry". Dr. Lev Koncevich of the Academy of Sciences of the U.S.S.R. (Moscow) visited the Institute from 9 to 13 April, 1989.

At the end of August, Dr. Pucek visited Peking to attend the 2nd International Conference on Korean Studies organized by Peking University and Osaka University of Economics and Law. Kuhfus gave a talk on the themes of two recent works by Jochen Hiltmann and Dieter Eikemeier/Michael Gööck devoted to aspects of Korean folk culture.
- 3. Dr. Yi Sŏng-mu of the ROK Academy of Korean Studies arrived in Tübingen in February, 1988 for one year as a research fellow. He did research into the <u>hyangyak</u> and the <u>kye</u>.

4. Dr. Rikemeier reports that in 1989, two new Korean Studies posts were created, one a lectorship in Korean, and one a research assistantship. His thesis concerned the problem of the definition of <u>yangban</u> status in the early Choson period. In April, 1989, Mr. van Baarle presented a lecture to the Netherlands-Korea Association on the topic of Dutch-Korean relations around 1900 based upon research on materials in the National Archives of the Netherlands.
- 4. On 9 June, 1989, Prof. Dr. Frits Vos read a paper on the legitimization of kingship in Korea on the occasion of the biennial conference of the Dutch Oriental Society.

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- 5. Mr. A.M. Olof twice visited Paris to continue work on the union catalogue of Korean periodicals in European libraries. ## UNION OF SOVIET SOCIALIST REPUBLICS =

### Leningrad

1. A. Lankov of Leningrad State University writes the following report about the development of Korean Studies at the University. Leningrad State University is one of three universities in the Soviet Union which teaches Korean as a primary subject of study. Korean is taught in the Department of Oriental Studies (Eastern Department) of the University, which has a distinguished history dating back to 1855. Korean was first taught at the University in the 1930's by Prof. Kholodovich as an optional subject to students of the Japanese Philology Section. In 1947, Korean became a primary subject of study. Currently, there are two sections, a Korean Philology Section, and a Korean History Section. Each section enrols from four to seven students every five to six years. Entrance is by competitive examination.

The Korean language is taught for five years for an average of 16 to 20 hours per week. Students also study English, Japanese, and ancient Chinese. Students in the Philology Section study Korean literature, linguistics and the history of the Korean language. In addition, they will study a short course on the history of Korea. Students in the History Section will study history and politics, including Oriental and world history and politics as well as doing a short course on Korean literature and art. Following the fourth year of study, students usually spend a ten-month period at Kim Il-sŏng University in the DPRK.

There are eight students in the 1990 graduating cohort in the Korean Philology Section, six of whom are from the Soviet Union and two from Poland. Seven or more students will be admitted to the 1990 entering cohort of the Korean History Section.

There are three academic members of staff; Mr. A. Vasiliev and Mr. Lim Su who teach the Korean language and Dr. A. Lankov who teaches Korean history. During the 1950's and 1960's, Dr. G. Rachkov played a great role in Korean Studies at the University, but he now concentrates on Philippine Studies.

2. A. Lankov received his doctorate in June, 1989 for a thesis on the subject of "Parties and Political Struggles in 16th to 18th Century Korea". This was the first doctoral dissertation on a Korean historical subject at Leningrad.

#### Mosco

1. Dr. Lev Koncevich reports that there is the possibility of the formation of a Soviet association for Korean Studies in the autumn of this year. Members of AKSE will watch this development with much interest.
