REPORTS OF STUDIES RELATED TO KOREA

BRITAIN

British Association for Korean Studies

The Association hosted its fifth annual conference in Sorby Hall at the University of Sheffield from 24 to 26 March, 1992. The conference began with a symposium "Women in Korea Today" for which the Keynote Speaker was Ms. Sonia R. Strawn of the Korean Legal Aid Center for Family Relations in Seoul. The following persons contributed papers to the symposium: Prof. Martina Deuchler (SOAS), "Historical Perspectives on the Position of Women in Korean Society"; Ms. Susan Pares (former FCO), "The Position of Women in Contemporary China and Korea"; Dr. Laurel Kendall (American Museum of Natural History, read by Dr. J. H. Grayson), "Romantic, Rational and Enlightened Matrimony? Courtship and Marriage in the Republic of Korea"; and Dr. Keith Howard (SOAS), "Three Women Artists".

Regular sessions of the conference included the following presentations: Ms. Beth McKillop (Victoria and Albert Museum), "The Samsung Gallery of Korean Art at the V&A"; Dr. Robert C. Provine (Durham), "For Korean Royal Ancestors: Chinese Music or Korean Music?"; Dr. Yong-kyoon No (Sheffield), "Pitfalls in Korean Inflectional Morphology and How to Overcome Them"; Dr. Mark Setton (Oxford), "The Shirhak-p'a - Myth or Reality?"; Dr. Peter Farrar (Korean War Veterans Association), "Selected Aspects of the Korean War (slide presentation); Warwick Morris (FCO), "Views of North Korea Today"; Mr. Sahang-shik Lee (Sheffield), "The Creation of an Information Society: Korean Governmental Policies towards Industrial and Cultural Development"; Mr. Jin-young Moon (Hull), "Three Perspectives on Development: Welfare Systems in East Asian NICs"; Dr. Yur-bok Lee (North Dakota State), "Robert Hart and China's Domination of the Korean Customs Service, 1882-1895"; Mr. Jin Park (Newcastle), "South Korean Politics and Democraticization under the Sixth Republic". A total of 63 people

attended all or part of the conference. Meetings of the Korea Library Group and the Korea Museums Group were held following the BAKS conference.

The officers of the Association for 1992/93 are Dr. James H. Grayson (Sheffield), President; Ms. Jane Irisa (British Library), Treasurer; and Dr. Gina Barnes (Cambridge), Secretary. Ordinary members of Council are Dr. Ross King (SOAS), Mr. Jin Park (Newcastle), and Mr. Young-han Kim (Cambridge). Dr. Keith Howard (SOAS) is Publications Committee chairman and Dr. James Hoare (FCO) is the new editor of the BAKS Newsletter.

Papers of the British Association for Korean Studies : a new interdisciplinary forum published by the British Association for Korean Studies and containing papers read at annual conferences and occasional seminars, together with book reviews and reports. Volumes 1-3 demonstrate the breadth of interests shared by the membership of the British Association for Korean Studies. Papers cover topics in history and intellectual history, religion, archaeology, culture, music, economics, politics and literature.

The *Papers* welcome submissions from authors. An editorial board considers each paper on its merits. Papers should ideally be submitted in hard and soft copy; notes on style are printed in each volume.

The *Papers* are published at roughly annual intervals and distributed to members of the British Association for Korean Studies.

Korea Library Group

The 1992 meeting of the Korea Library Group was held following the annual conference of the British Association for Korean Studies in Sheffield. Present were representatives from the British Library, Durham, Oxford, and Sheffield. Following a review of developments at individual institutions, the group examined its proposal to the Korea Research Foundation to support a pilot project for the automation of library and research resources. This proposal had been submitted at the end of 1991. As of the 1992 meeting, word had not been received from the KRF as to whether they would fund this proposal or not. Further discussion was had about the operation of the Co-operative Acquisitions Scheme for Korean Studies (CASKS) by which

institutions shared extra materials and sought to ensure the presence in Britain of important Korean language research materials.

London

1. Professor Martina Deuchler, chairman of the Centre for Korean Studies, continued to teach Korean history and language to a great number of students in specialized courses as well as in survey courses. She also gave several special lectures: on "Japanese and Korean State Formation", together with Dr. Gina Barnes, University of Cambridge, in the Japan Research Centre Seminar, SOAS, on November 27, 1991; on "The Mongols in Korea" in the Mongol Studies Unit, Cambridge University, on February 19, 1992; on "Family and Women in the Confucian Tradition" in a one-day seminar on "The Wisdom of China" on February 29, 1992; on "Modern Korea" in Eltham College, on March 20; on "Historical Perspectives on the Position of Women in Korean Society" in the Symposium on "Women in Korea Today" at the Annual Conference of the British Association for Korean Studies, held at the University of Sheffield, on March 25; on "Strukturelle Wandlung der koreanischen Gesellschaft unter dem Einfluss des Konfuzianismus" at the invitation of the Korea-Institut, Humboldt University, Berlin, on April 23, 1992. Moreover, she participated in the research workshop on "Confucianism and Late Choson Korea" held at the University of California, Los Angeles, in January, 1992. She read a paper entitled "Despoilers of the Way - Insulters of the Sages: Classics Controversies in Seventeenth-Century Korea" and chaired a session. Her new book *The Confucian Transformation of Korea. A Study of Society and Ideology* will come off the press this fall as No. 36 of the Harvard-Yenching Institute Monographs.

2. Dr. Ross King, assisted by Mr. Jae Hoon Yeon, is now teaching a full four-year program in Korean language and literature. He and Yeon continue work on the revision of Martin and Lee's *Beginning Korean* (1969), and this project has grown into a complete reorganization of this textbook. Upon completion, this will be an entirely new and up-dated version of the original work. Dr. King also plans to produce an *Advanced Reader in Korean Short Fiction* based on 20 short stories 1906-1990 that will be used in 4th-year Korean Literature courses.

Dr. King visited Kazakhstan for three and a half weeks in March-April with Mr. Yeon in order to carry out further field work on Soviet Korean Dialects. As a result of this trip he and Mr. Yeon co-authored a substantial article to be published shortly in Korea. Dr. King moreover has advanced

work on his planned three-volume *Russian Sources on Korean Dialects*. Dr. King has become a member of the Philological Society, London, and gave lectures in the East Asia Forum, University of Sheffield, and in a seminar jointly sponsored by the Anglo-Korean Society and SOAS Centre for Korean Studies.

3. Dr. Youngsook Pak pursues a busy teaching schedule. She not only contributes to the Theory and Method in Art History course in the Department of Art and Archaeology, but also gives specialized lecture courses entitled Outline History of Korean Art and Religious Art in Korea. Moreover, she is in charge of Advanced Korean Readings (non-fiction) and supervises the work of two Ph.D. students in Korean art history. She read a paper "Function and Meaning in Buddhist Art" at a seminar organized by the University of Leiden, October 24-26, 1991. At the invitation of the Korea Foundation (formerly International Cultural Society of Korea) Dr. Pak undertook a lecture tour speaking on Korean art through major art museums in the United States (Seattle, Cleveland, Dallas, and San Francisco). She is also a member of the executive committee of the Anglo-Korean Society, London. Her long-awaited book *Korean Buddhist Painting* will come out in the fall. Dr. Pak is invited to be a consultant of Korean art in *Visions of Asia*, a television series of three one-hour programs exploring classic and contemporary Asian art. This project is funded by Independent Production, New York, and will be broadcast on Public Television, USA, in 1993.

4. Mr. Jae Hoon Yeon continues to teach Korean as an indispensable native speaker and collaborates with Dr. King on the revision of Martin and Lee's *Beginning Korean*. He also taught the Korean evening course in the SOAS External Services Division and prepares, together with Dr. King, an introductory text *Teach Yourself Korean* for Hodder and Stoughton Publishers. Mr. Yeon accompanied Dr. King to Kazakhstan to conduct joint research on Soviet-Korean dialects. Mr. Yeon attended the BAKS conference in Sheffield, and continues to work on his Ph. D. in Linguistics at SOAS.

5. Dr. Keith Howard, who became a full-time lecturer in Korean Studies last fall, had only limited teaching responsibilities, and devoted himself to various promotional tasks for the Centre for Korean Studies. He introduced himself with a workshop demonstration of Korean percussion instruments on October 29, 1991. Moreover, he wrote and presented two programmes on BBC Radio 3 in January and February 1992: *Preserving the Land of Morning Calm*, and *Korean Melody*. Both were well received. Inok Paek recorded *Mannam*, a piece for *kayagum* and tape by the Mexican

composer Javier Alvarez, for Saydisc. The CD will appear in autumn 1992. This work, and another new work by the British composer Bennett Hogg, were performed at the South Bank in London. Concerts including traditional music and Alvarez work took place in Berlin, Geneva, Belfast, and Bourges, France.

In June Dr. Howard spent three weeks in North Korea under the auspices of the British Academy.

6. The Korean program has been boosted by the conclusion of an official exchange agreement with Korea University, Seoul. All students of Korean language are now required to spend their third year in Korea at Korea University's new International Division and the Minjok Munhwa Yon'guso. In return, SOAS will be the host institution for students from Korea University. The exchange will come into effect in the fall of this year. During 1991-1992, the undergraduate program included fifteen students learning Korean at different levels.

Four students graduate in Korean in June 1992, three of them with first-class honors. All three presented individual research projects: Janet Poole, "The Theme of Pilgrimage in Contemporary Korean Women Writers' Fiction"; Isolde Standish, "Korean Cinema and the New Realism"; Steven Cox, "Made in the Translator's Image: the Translation of the Korean New Testament, 1896-1900."

Three students are enrolled in the Ph.D. program and are preparing dissertations: Lisa Bailey, "Adorning the Dead: Mortuary Differentiation in Korean and Japanese Tombs of the Fifth and Sixth Centuries"; Rose Lee, "The Diamond Mountains: A Portrait in Travel Literature and Paintings up to the Eighteenth Century", and Young-joo Lee, "Ch'ong Ch'ol's Poetic Works."

7. The Centre for Korean Studies sponsored some public events: Dr. Keith Howard, "A Musical Introduction to Korea"; (in conjunction with the Japan Research Centre) Prof. Martina Deuchler and Dr. Gina Barnes, "Japanese and Korean State Formation"; and a seminar on "The Prospects for Reunification on the Korean Peninsula" with Ambassador Dr. Hongkoo Lee as keynote speaker, and Dr. Beatrice Heuser (King's College), Dr. Jin Park (University of Newcastle), and Dr. Michael Yahuda (London School of Economics) as discussants.

Sheffield

1. Dr. James H. Grayson reported that he taught the Final Papers subjects in Korean History, Korean Culture and Society, and the Philosophical Traditions of East Asia, as well as instructing the reading sections of the Elementary and Intermediate Korean language courses. Much of his time was spent this year in making preparations for the 1992 annual conference of the British Association for Korean Studies which was held at the University of Sheffield from 24 to 26 March. Preparing material to be submitted to the central administration of the University to enhance the teaching of Korean Studies at Sheffield took further large bites of Dr. Grayson's time.

2. Dr. Yongkyoon No was appointed to the second lectureship in Modern Korean Studies at the University from October, 1991. Dr. No is a linguist and has been assigned the special task of preparing the curriculum for an intensive programme of instruction in the Korean language which will be undertaken when Korean Studies formally becomes a dual honours degree subject in its own right. Dr. No was responsible this year for the instruction of the Elementary and Advanced Korean language courses. He is presently engaged in creating a Finals Paper subject in the Linguistics of Korean which will be available from October, 1992.

3. Ms. Lee Hyang-jin of the Korean Language Institute of Yonsei University came to join the staff of the Centre for two years. Ms. Lee is a doctoral candidate in Sociology at Yonsei University.

4. Dr. Kim Yongsök of the Department of Korean Language Education of Kyōngsang National University in Chinju arrived in Sheffield in mid-December for a sabbatical period of one year. He is presently doing research on native language teaching.

5. A total of fifty-six students studied Korean Studies subjects during the academic year 1991-92. Of these students, eighteen students did a language course, seven students took the Finals Paper in Korean history, seven students did the course in the Culture and Society of Korea, and twenty-three students did the course the Philosophical Traditions of East Asia.

6. Two students, Kenneth Wong and Mei-tin Chen, plan to spend the summer in Korea studying at the Division of International Education at Yonsei University.

7. In January, 1992, the University Senate approved the creation of a third lectureship in Modern Korean Studies which was to be filled preferably by someone with expertise in Economics, Business Studies, or some other related social science. The person appointed would take up his/her post in October, 1992 and would be given the task of creating a Finals Paper subject in the Economy of Korea.

8. The University Senate in January, 1992 also approved the creation of three degree subjects in the area of Korean Studies: a BA degree in Japanese and Korean Studies, a dual honours degree in Korean Studies and Linguistics, and a dual honours degree in Korean Studies and Business Studies. The first mentioned degree programme would be available to students from the academic year 1992/93. It is anticipated that several students currently doing a Single Honours degree course in Japanese Studies at the University will transfer into this new degree programme. The other two degree courses, incorporating an intensive language year, will be on offer to prospective students from the academic year 1993/94.

1. Ritva Lehonkoski has been working on her Ph.D. Thesis which deals with Transitivity in Korean. On March 16, 1992 she gave a presentation of her research in a seminar arranged in the Department of General Linguistics at the University of Helsinki.

2. There have been 15 students attending the basic course in Korean during the academic year 1991-1992. One undergraduate student has just left for Seoul (in February) and is planning to stay there for a year studying Korean at Seoul National University. Another student who has been one year in Korea is expected to return to Finland soon.

3. The 3rd Nordic Symposium on Japanese and Korean Studies will be held at the University of Tampere, Finland, May 24-27, 1992. It will be the largest symposium held on this field in Scandinavia so far. The Symposium is jointly organized by the Nordic Institute of Asian Studies (NIAS), Nordic Association for Japanese and Korean Studies and Tampere Society for Japanese and Korean studies. Tübingen

1. In March 1990, Mr. Paik Sungjong (Paek Sungjong), M.A., went to Korea to collect materials relevant to his dissertation. So did Mr. Jörg Trappmann, M.A., for three months in the summer of 1990. Mr. Paik had received a grant from the Korea Research Foundation, and Mr. Trappmann from the Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst (German Academic Exchange Service), in support of their work.

Dieter Eikemeier contributed to a panel on "Education in Pre-Modern Korea", which was hosted by the Joint Committees on European- American Exchanges and was part of the 33rd International Conference on Asian and North African studies (ICANAS), Toronto, August 1990.

In January 1992, Dieter Eikemeier took part in the conference on "Confucianism and Late Chosön Korea", which was held at the University of California, Los Angeles. He presented the first part of a paper entitled "A Virtuous Man's Circuit and Beyond. A Preliminary Inquiry into Hong Chungsam's Chu Wen-kung tseng-sun hsiang-yieh t'ongbyon".

Mrs. Uta M. Kruse was accepted as a doctoral student in Korean Studies at Tübingen University. She plans to write a dissertation, the preliminary title of which is "Schamanenfibeln" (Shamans' text books).

2. Between February 24 and 28, 1991, Dieter Eikemeier accompanied Dr. Richard von Weizäcker, President of the Federal Republic of Germany, on his state visit to the Republic of Korea. Dieter Eikemeier was a member of the President's official delegation. Dres. Dirk Fündling and Dietrich Stiller were two more people from among the Korean studies community in Germany who were involved in the state visit. They served as interpreters to Mr. D. Spranger, Minister of Economic Co-operation, and to the President himself. In the beginning of March 1991, a delegation from the Academy of Sciences of the DRPK, consisting of four scientists, paid a courtesy call to Tübingen University and was received by its President.

As a member of a delegation of the Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst (German Academic Exchange Service), Dieter Eikemeier visited Peking, the DRPK, and the Mongolian People's Republic, between September 17th and October 13th, 1991. The purpose of the visit was to

negotiate accommodation of the scientific and scholarly relations as were maintained between those countries and the German Democratic Republic to the new conditions of unified Germany.

HUNGARY

1. Gábor Osváth presented a paper entitled "The problems of teaching Korean in Hungary" at the Symposium held in the College for Foreign Trade, 23-24 April, 1992.

2. In 1991-92 twenty students of the College for Foreign Trade studied Korean language, history, and economic-geography at the first, second and third-year levels. Eight of them graduated in June, 1992 - for the first time in the College. Two students wrote a diplom-work about Korea: Zoltán Pungor, "The History of Economic Cooperation between Hungary and Korea"; László Ludmár, "The business strategy of Samsung Electronics Co. in Hungary".

In summer 1991 István Balogh, then a second-year level student, was invited by the Korean Research Foundation for a one month language course in Seoul.

3. A Korea Day was organised by the College for Foreign Trade on 25 March, 1992 in Budapest on the occasion of the 20th anniversary of the College and 100th anniversary of Hungarian-Korean relations, with the participation of H.E. Ambassador Mr. Pak Yong-Woo and heads of offices of different Korean companies at Budapest. Two papers were presented - Dr. Károly Fendler, lector of CFT: "One hundred years of Hungarian-Korean cultural relations", and Mr. Lee Chin-Hyun: "The Present state of economic cooperation between Korea and Hungary" (in Hungarian). A small exhibition was also held - Hungarian books, editions, photos etc. on Korea in the last 100 years.
