Han Madi: a word from the President.

The economic turbulence that since the last months of 1997 has plagued the economies of East Asia, has not left AKSE unaffected. It was one of the reasons that this year we had to do without the intensive, small-scale workshops that ordinarily are organised in the years we do not have a regular conference. Yet I am happy to say that for next year we do not foresee major problems with the organisation of the biennial conference in Hamburg, for which preparations are in full swing. We hope that many of you will be able to attend and that the programme will satisfy many different interests.

Although this year the workshops had to be cancelled or postponed, there were some AKSE activities of a different order. As usual AKSE sent two scholars, Yeon Jaehoon from SOAS and Anders Karlsson from Stockholm University, to the annual meeting of the Association for Asian Studies, which this time was held in Washington DC. In this connection, I would like to remind you that AKSF and the AAS have concluded an agreement making it cheaper for an AKSE member to become a joint member of the AAS, which gives one the right to take part in AAS conferences. The details concerning this arrangement you will find elsewhere in this Newsletter.

Participating in a panel, our former President Robert Provine represented AKSE in Seattle at the biennial meeting of PACKS, AKSE's counterpart on the Pacific Rim.

AKSE was also represented at the first International Convention of Asia Scholars (ICAS) which was held in Noordwijkerhout, The Netherlands, 25-28 June 1998, under the auspices of the IIAS, the AAS and the European Science Foundation. In a special AKSE panel, James Lewis, Burglind Jungmann and Kenneth Robinson pursued their investigations into Chosön-period Japanese-Korean relations, about which they first reported during the 1997 Stockholm conference. Sadly, the discussant invited, Dr. Etsuko Kang, suddenly passed away a few weeks before the conference took place. Travel grants to make the participation in this panel possible were provided by the European Science Foundation.

Partial results of the 1996 AKSE colloquium on Seoul organised by Alexandre Guilleminot at the École des hautes Études en Sciences sociales (EHESS) were published in December 1997 as a special issue ("La ville de Séoul") of *Revue de Corée* (Vol. 29, No.2). Gathered in this volume are the papers that originally were presented in French. We expect the papers that were written in English to be published in the coming year.

It is one of the pleasant "duties" of the President to draw attention to those who in one form or another have contributed to the activities of AKSE, as convener for a conference panel, editor of the Newsletter or other AKSE publications, as speaker during our own conferences or as representative to conferences on other continents, or by maintaining the AKSE Homepage on the Internet. This time I feel a special urgency in expressing my gratitude to the "working members,"

whom I cannot all mention by name here, but to whom we owe the fact that AKSE more than twenty years after it was founded continues to thrive. In 1999, when we meet in Hamburg, my term as AKSE President will come to an end. As perhaps not all of you will be able to attend the conference, I would like to avail myself of this opportunity to thank you all for your trust and for all the help and encouragement I have received these years.

CONFERENCE REPORT

First International Convention of Asia Scholars (ICAS),
25-28 June 1998, Noordwijkerhout, The Netherlands.

AKSE Panel: *Chosön Envoys to Japan and Tsushima and Japanese Envoys to Chosön: Regions and Centres.* (sponsored by the European Science Foundation)

Paper presenters:

Dr. Kenneth R. Robinson (International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan): "Korean envoys to Japan and Tsushima/Taemado in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries";

Dr. James B. Lewis (University of Oxford, United Kingdom): "Functions and costs of local and national envoys in Chosön-Japan relations, 1609-1876";

Dr. habil. Burghard Jungmann (University of Heidelberg, Germany): "Painters as Envoy: Gion Nankai and the Korean Embassy to Japan of 1711";

The papers focused on two general points: envoys and regions/centres. The discussion of envoys pointed to the enormous interaction (diplomatic, economic, and cultural) between Korea and Japan during a period that has been called the 'sakoku' (closed country) period in Japanese history and the period of the 'hermit kingdom' in Korean history. Both concepts actually derived from contemporary or subsequent European assessments of the lack of European access to both countries and did not reflect the constant interaction both countries had with each other. The discussion of regions/centres pointed to the site of interaction as being outside the capital cities and located in the frontier regions between Korea and Japan, often centred on the island of Tsushima in the straits between the peninsula and the archipelago.

Robinson's paper discussed Chosön Korea's geographical conceptions regarding the island of Tsushima and argued that Chosön Korea viewed Korean territory as beginning from Tsushima. This view was reflected in the administrative titles given to Korean envoys to the island, representations on maps, and other terminology employed in Korean discourses regarding Tsushima in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries.

Lewis's paper discussed the functions and costs of the envoys that went back and forth between Korea and Japan in the seventeenth to nineteenth centuries. Japanese envoys to Korea were after trade and Korean envoys to Japan were after intelligence information as well as engaging in a *mission civilisatrice*. Koreans received Japanese envoys as part of their policy to control piracy and from a sense of generosity. Japanese received Korean envoys to acquire cultural stimulation and political prestige. Costs became crippling by 1800.

Jungmann's paper discussed the cultural exchanges that took place accompanying diplomacy and trade. Artists and intellectuals from Korea and Japan met and traded poetry and paintings. A case study of the Japanese painter Gion Nankai, who participated in hosting the 1711 Korean Embassy to Japan, shows that the development of his literati painting style owed much to Korean influence.

REPORTS OF ACTIVITIES AND RESEARCH RELATED TO KOREA

CZECH REPUBLIC

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During the 1997/98 academic year, 24 undergraduates continued their studies at the seminar. Two students received a 6-month Korea Foundation Language Training Fellowship, which they spent at Yonsei University, one student received a one-year ROK government fellowship.

Teaching staff: PhD. Vladimír Pucek, associated professor, PhD. Marta Buskova, PhDr. Miriam Lowensteinová, prof. Lee Doo-sun, PhD. (exchange professor from the HUFS, Seoul), Mgr. Tomáš Horák (assistant); part-time professors: PhD. Jaroslav Barinka, Dr. Zdena Klošlova.

I. Gruberová finished her doctoral studies and received a PhD degree at the Charles University (thesis: Manhae Han Yong-un - *Nimui ch'immuk*).

M. Lowensteinová spent 2 months at Korea University (on a KF scholarship) to collect materials on the postwar Korean literature (thesis: Searching for Self-Identity in the Korean Novel of 80-90's).

V. Pluek took part in the 6th International Conference on Korean Linguistics organized by the Han'gil Hakhoe in Seoul, October 1997 and presented a paper on *Korean Language Education and Textbook Preparations at the Charles University*.

Prof. Ahn Byung-man, President of the Hankuk University of Foreign Studies, Seoul, was invited to a conference on "The Role of the University at the Threshold of the 21th Century" held on the occasion of the 650th anniversary of the founding of the Charles University in Praha. He was also awarded with a Jubilee Medal of the Charles University.

The Korean seminar and the Czech-Korean Society participated actively in preparations of a performance of the Korean musical „A Dream of Chang Pogo“ staged at the Praha State Opera by the Hyundai Corp. on October 8th, 1997.

The Oriental Institute

Academy of Sciences of the Czech Republic

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Two generous donations enriched the book funds of the Korean library of the Oriental Institute in autumn 1997:

- volumes (140 titles) of books sent by the Korea Foundation (works on ancient and modern Korean history, literature, linguistics, religion, ethnography, arts and theatre, politics, dictionaries, etc.)
- volumes of books sent by the MBC and the Korean Publishers Association in its project *Sarang ch'aek ponaegi* containing, among others, The Toosan World Encyclopedia (30 volumes) and the Korean National Dictionary (28 volumes).

Thanks to this generous sponsorship of the Korea Foundation, Korean studies can be again pursued after a break of several years.

In January 1998, S. Cejnarova, a student in the 5th year of study, started working in the Oriental Institute and Z. Kloslova works there part-time since April 1998.

GERMANY

Humboldt Universität Berlin

Activities of individual scholars:

Prof. Dr. Reta Rentner read a paper at the *Asien-Pazifik-Wochen* in Berlin (23.09.1997) on “Koreanische Druckkunst und die geistige Welt der Literatur”. In June 1998, she spoke during the *Koreanwissenschaftliche Tage* workshop at the Humboldt University Berlin, on “Die Rezeption Kang Kyōng-ae's (1907-1943) im In- und Ausland”;

Dr. Sonja Häußler read a paper at the 7th IAKLE conference at Yonsei University (6./7.9.1997) on “the Situation and the Problems of Korean Language Education in Korean Schools in Germany - the Berlin *Hanin hallyeo* as a case study”. At the International conference held on the 100th anniversary of Korean studies at St. Petersburg State University (14.10.-16.10.1997) she presented a paper on “Discussions about Chong Mong-ju's loyalty during the Yi dynasty”. In September 1997, she participated in the International Conference on Literacy & Hangul in Memory of the 600th Anniversary of King Sejong held at the Sejong Memorial Hall. During the *Koreanwissenschaftliche Tage* 1998 at

Humboldt University she read a paper on "Korean scholars in the countryside - the case of Cho Sik".

Rüdiger Frank, M.A. read a paper during the *Koreanwissenschaftliche Tage 1997*, Humboldt University Berlin, June 1997, on "Liberalisierung in Südkorea". At the *Koreanwissenschaftliche Tage 1998*, he presented a paper on "Besonderheiten der Unternehmensstruktur Südkoreas als Hintergrund der Krise vom Winter 1997". Earlier in the year (27 January 1998) he read a paper at the Ostasien-Kolloquium, Universität GH Duisburg on "Interne und externe Charakteristika südkoreanischer Unternehmen".

Rüdiger FRANK gave four weekend-lectures at Duisburg University on Korean history, culture, politics and economics. From 18 March until 1 April he conducted field research in South Korea on his dissertation: Deregulation in the Telecommunications Market of South Korea (working title) and held lectures at Inha University in Inch'ón and Chungang University in Ansöng. Major fields of interest are corporate governance and the relationship between traditional values and western democracy (in Korea and in general).

Report of the academic programme of study at the Humboldt University:

In the academic year of 1997/98 the regular staff of the Seminar für Koreanistik consisted of Prof. Dr. Reta Rentner, Dr. phil. Wilfried Herrmann, Dr. phil. Sonja Häußler and M.A. Rüdiger Frank.

With the support of the Korea Foundation Guest Professor Dr. Lee Yeong-Heui gave lectures on Korean Economy (between April 1997 and March 1998).

Partially supported by a grant of the Korea Foundation Dr. Bak Hyun-Mi and Paek Sang-Hyun gave lectures on "Korean Conversation".

In May 1998 Dr. Pak Chang-soo, Potsdam, gave a guest lecture on the "controversies about Kim Pu-sik's Samguk sagi".

Ulrike Wörz and Lee You-Jae received the MA degree in Korean Studies as a second major subject in March 1998.

Other activities relating to Korean Studies:

Both events were included in the program of the Asien-Pazifik-Wochen initiated by the Senat of Berlin city.

In the summer semester 1998 a Korea-Kolloquium was organised, with six professionals from outside the Korea-Institute of the Humboldt-University Berlin giving a short presentation of their organisations and making remarks on recent developments in Korea, related to their daily work. The "Korean-Kolloquium 1998" was intended to provide students and interested persons with information and the chance to make or refresh contacts.

Activities of individual scholars

In July 1998, Dr. Marion Eggert finished her Habilitation (second doctorate) in "Chinese and Korean Studies".

On August 1, 1998, Yvonne Schulz Zinda, M.A., moved to Göttingen where she takes part in a project on early modern Chinese philosophy and simultaneously pursues her interest in Korean philosophy of the same period.

Program developments

With financial support from the Korea Foundation, Munich University and the Bavarian Ministry of Culture, the Korean section of the library of the Institute of East Asian Studies is being catalogued and moved to a more accessible place in the library. This project will be finished during 1998. It was mainly carried through by Yvonne Schulz Zinda, with Soon Mi Hong Schunka adding final touches. As a result, the books are more easily available to students and the general public, which has already resulted in an increased interest by some students in Korean Studies.

The Korean language courses offered at Munich University have doubled from 4 hours (two units) to 8 hours (4 units). In 1998, courses are taught by Yvonne Schulz Zinda, Soon Mi Hong Schunka, and Marion Eggert.

Activities of individual scholars:

From January 30 to February 1, 1997, Professor D. Eikemeier and Dr. Paik Sungjöng took part in a seminar entitled „Drängt Asien Westeuropa ins wirtschaftliche Abseits?“ The seminar, organized by the Department of Economics of Tübingen University, was held at the conference centre of Tübingen University at Blaubeuren.

On June 19, 1997, Dr. Paik Sungjöng attended the summer session of the Arbeitskreis für Agrargeschichte im Max-Planck-Institut für Geschichte, Göttingen.

On September 18, 1997, Dr. Paik Sungjöng in Kyoto presented a paper entitled "Strategies for survival: Variability of family structure in Tōkō Village on Cheju Island," within the cadre of a conference on the stem family which was organized by the International Commission for Historical Demography in collaboration with the International Centre of Japanese Studies, Kyoto University.

On November 5-8, 1997, Professor D. Eikemeier took part in the conference on "Asien - Korea - Yun", organized by the Internationale Isang-Yun-Gesellschaft in Berlin, and presented a paper entitled "Metaphorisch über die Musik Yun Isangs reden."

On November 13, 1997, within the framework of the "Vorträge und Berichte aus der ostasienwissenschaftlichen Forschung in Tübingen" Professor D. Eikemeier together with Dr. Stefan Bumbacher directed a discussion on "Wie kann man für eine breitere Leserschaft über Religionen in Ostasien schreiben?"

On March 16-19, 1998, the Seminar für Sinologie und Koreanistik held its International Workshop on Religion and Economy in East Asia, at the conference centre of Tübingen University at Blaubeuren. Professor D. Eikemeier presented a paper on "What are Korean village deities good for?", and Dr. Paik Sungjöng one on "Maitreya, guarantor of welfare in Korea." Two more Korea-related papers were presented by Professor Kim Song-Nae (Kim Söngnye) on "Economic thought of traditional religion in Korea," and Professor Park Hyong's (Pak Hyöng) on "Sacrifice in Korean folk religion."

In March and April, 1998, Dr. Song Moon-Ey (Song Munü) went to Korea where, among other things, she presented the report on her translation of Han Susan's *Puch'ō* to the Taesan Foundation and discussed details concerning the publication of the translation.

The Seminar für Sinologie und Koreanistik has drafted a new teaching programme, by "modulizing" both the Chinese and Korean studies curricula. After the vacancy in one of the Japanese studies professorships has been filled, Japanese studies is expected soon to join Chinese and Korean studies in their effort. The aims pursued by the change are, first, to adjust the teaching of Far Eastern studies at Tübingen University to international standards and, secondly, more to interconnect the hitherto, in Germany, rather strictly separated fields of Chinese, Japanese, and Korean studies as well as to interconnect the latter with other disciplines.

A one-year grant by the Korea Foundation to enlarge the language teaching programme has expired. The Korean Studies Section is trying to raise new funds to continue the programme.

On April 15, 1998, Mrs. Doris Sabine Spani graduated from Korean Studies. Her thesis was entitled: "Das Maudgalyayana-Sutra im 23. Kapitel des Wörnsöko. Annotierte Übersetzung einer ausgewählten Stelle und Erläuterungen."

On June 17, 1998, Professor Chu Chonggyöön (Kookmin University, Seoul) gave a lecture on "Koreanische Volksmärchen und Grimms Märchen: Eine komparative Studie."

On July 8, 1998, Professor Robert C. Provine (University of Durham) gave two lectures, one on "Korean Music Notation" and the other on "How Words fit into Music in Korea: The case of sijo and kasa."

Professor D. Eikemeier is continuing in his post as organizer of the lecture series "Vorträge und Berichte aus der ostasienwissenschaftlichen Forschung in Tübingen," which is meant to make better known the individual scholars' ongoing research efforts among the members of the Far Eastern studies institutions as well as among the members of Tübingen University at large and which has in the meantime become a regular feature of the academic activities at Tübingen University.

Other activities :

It is gratefully acknowledged that the Korea Foundation has been continuing, and even enlarged, its support of Korean studies in Tübingen. It did not only offer a grant to help extending the language programme (see above). Also, Mr. Park Jeong-yeop (Pak Chöngyöp), Vice-President of the Korea Foundation, offered a book donation worth DM 6000 when he and his delegation visited the Korean Studies Section on November 25, 1997. The offer was spontaneously made under the impression of the size and quality of the Korean library holdings as well as of their organization.

It is also gratefully acknowledged that the Samsung Press Foundation (*Samsöng öllon chaeidan*) offered a subscription to the *Chungang ilbo*.

A Baden-Württemberg Branch of the Deutsch-Koreanische Gesellschaft has

been established in the summer of the year 1997. Dr. Song Moon-Ey is serving as its vice-president.

On May 16, 1997, Dr. Koh Jang-Gwon (Ko Changgwón), President of Cheju National University, and his delegation paid a courtesy call on the Korean Studies Section.

Mr. Albert Petersen, a pharmaceutical consultant to a relief programme organized by the Lutheran Church on behalf of the DPRK, gave two talks, one on November 20, 1997, and the other on April 29, 1998, on the experiences he made during two stays in the DPRK.

On June 12, 1998, the Deutsch-Ostasiatische Wissenschaftsforum, seated in Tübingen, celebrated its 10th anniversary. The festive meeting was graced by a performance of a group of Korean amateur musicians from Heidelberg.

The lecture series "Ostasien vor dem 21.Jahrhundert" which had been mentioned in the previous Newsletter, had to be postponed, but is currently scheduled for the summer term of the year 1999 and might be continued into the year 2000.

London, SOAS, Centre of Korean Studies

Korea Library Group

During the academic session 1997/98, the Group met twice, on 17 September, 1997 and on 8 April, 1998 during the 1998 Biennial Meeting of the British Association for Korean Studies. During the September meeting, it had been decided that the Group would meet twice during the academic session to further communication between librarians concerned with Korean Studies research materials. At the April meeting, James H. Grayson stepped down as Convenor of the Group and Beth McKillop of the British Library was elected as Convenor in his place. Funding received by the Group for a pilot project to investigate the development of a national automated union catalogue of vernacular Korean materials was transferred from SOAS in London to Sheffield. The libraries of Sheffield and Oxford Universities have been co-operating in addressing the various problems in creating the database. Currently work is proceeding, investigating the use of the *allegro* system with Unionway as a possible front-end processor.

Prof. Martina Deuchler continued as chairperson of the Centre for Korean Studies. She taught Korean history at all levels and continues to supervise seven PhD/MPhil students in Korean history. In October 1997 she was the only European scholar to be invited to the inaugural conference on "Royal Power and the Bureaucracy in East Asia" organized by the newly established Association of Chosón Dynasty History in Seoul. She read a paper on landed elites in late Chosón. In March 1998 she participated by giving a paper on the panel "Public and Private in Late Chosón Korea" at the annual conference of the Association for Asian Studies in Washington, D.C. In June 1998 she was invited to a workshop on the "Vernacularization Millennium" organized by the Swedish Institute for Advanced Studies in the Social Sciences in Uppsala. She presented a paper on the significance of *Hummin chǒngtüm* and literacy in early Chosón Korea.

The book manuscript entitled "Culture and the State in Late Chosón Korea" which she has edited in collaboration with JaHyun Kim Haboush has been accepted for publication by the Council on East Asian Studies, Harvard University, and is scheduled to come out in 1999.

Dr. Youngsook Pak teaches in both the Department of East Asia and the Department of Art & Archaeology. In the Department of East Asia she has developed a new one-unit course in Korean contemporary fiction in addition to a course in Advanced Readings.

GREAT BRITAIN

Dr. Pak researches on Korean art in the context of East Asian art and Buddhist art and has just published a long essay, "Korean Art at the Metropolitan Museum," for *Arts of Korea*, edited by Judith Smith (New York: Metropolitan Museum of Art, 1998), pp. 403-449, 471-479. She worked as a consultant of the Korean Gallery at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, which was officially opened on 7 June, 1998, by President Kim Dae-jung.

Dr. Pak gave a lecture on Koguryo wall paintings at the British Museum on 29 October 1997. She read a paper and chaired a session at the International Conference on Korean Studies, St. Petersburg University, Russia, 13-16 October, 1997. In addition, she was invited to give two lectures on "Aesthetic Concept in Korean Art" and "The Silk Road and Ancient Korea" at the Institute of Oriental Studies, University of Stockholm, under the auspices of the Royal Swedish Academy, 25-26 May, 1998. She also gave a talk on "Textile patterns in Koryo Buddhist Paintings" at the AEDTA (Association pour l'Etude et la Documentation des Textiles d'Asie) Round-Table, Paris 7-9 July, 1998.

Dr. Keith Howard gave a paper and a concert at the conference of the Society for Ethnomusicology in Pittsburgh in November 1997, delivered a report at the Association for Korean Music Research in November 1997, and gave a paper on "Pop Culture in Asia", in Victoria, BC, in April 1998. He further attended the conferences of the British Forum for Ethnomusicology, Cambridge (March 1998), and of the Association for Korean Studies, Oxford (April 1998). He also attended the UNESCO symposium on shamanism in September 1998. Dr. Howard was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts.

Dr. Jaehoon Yeon taught Korean language and literature at all levels with the assistance of External Academic Assistant, Ms. Jackie Cho. In addition to teaching, he acted as Admissions Tutor for Korean Studies, and as the Academic Director of Korean Language in the Language Centre at SOAS. He supervised two MPhil/PhD students in linguistics. In March, 1998, he visited the US and presented a paper entitled "Transitivity Alternations and Neutral verbs in Korean" at the annual meeting of the Association for Asian Studies in Washington. This visit was supported by a AKSE grant. During the last academic year, Dr. Yeon published two academic papers on Korean linguistics. He also contributed a chapter on Teaching of the Korean Language as a Foreign Language to a book entitled *Teacher's Guide to Korean Language Teaching* published by the Korean National Open University. Dr. Yeon's long-awaited textbook *Korean: A Foundation Course*, which he prepared with Prof. Ross King, will at last be published by Tuttle Publishing Company at the end of this year.

All members of the Centre of Korean Studies were members of a jury for the Korea Essay Contest, organized jointly by SOAS, the Embassy of the Republic of Korea, Daewoo, and the Times Supplements Ltd. The Award Ceremony for the winners took place on December 12, 1997.

The Centre of Korean Studies was fortunate to receive as a gift from Samsung Europe a standalone computer that is exclusively used to read Korean language materials.

- The Centre administered a taught MA programme for the third year with six students. Taeyon Kim received the SOAS MA prize for her excellent work. The number of students at the BA is also steadily increasing. Five PhD student received scholarship aid from the Korea Foundation.

The Oriental Institute, Oxford University

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Report of the academic programme of study:

This past year saw three milestones in the Korean Studies programme at Oxford. We graduated our first Master of Studies' student with Distinction, we examined our first cohort of students of Chinese studying Korean history in Chinese, and we received our first outside, private benefaction towards the survival of the programme (50,000 pounds sterling from Dr. Hee Seung Chong, President of the Santec Corporation). The Faculty of Oriental Studies reaffirmed its resolve to continue Korean Studies at Oxford, and the University is continuing its active search for permanent endowment funds.

Graduate Programme:

In the autumn of 1997 we admitted Mr. Andrew Pratt (BA in Korean Studies, SOAS, University of London) and Ms. Grace Koh (BA in Comparative Literature, American University of Paris) to the Master of Studies programme. Mr. Pratt won a Korea Foundation scholarship. Both candidates successfully completed the course of study in June, 1998. Ms. Koh's performances in the written examinations and the viva voce examination were so outstanding that the Examiners unanimously agreed to award her a Distinction. This is the first such Distinction since admitting students from 1995-1996. Both candidates completed dissertations. Mr. Pratt's dissertation was entitled: "The *Mye Tobo Tongji*: A description and analysis". Ms. Koh's dissertation was entitled: "Modernism in Korean literature". The Faculty of Oriental Studies admitted Ms. Bonnie S. Kim from Michaelmas Term, 1998, to begin reading for the Master of Studies in Korean Studies, and Ms. Kim has been recommended to the Korea Foundation for a scholarship.

Mr. Michael Finch (BA Cambridge, MA Yonsei), our first D.Phil. candidate, was awarded a Daesan Foundation scholarship and successfully completed his Confirmation examination and has prepared a complete draft of his D.Phil. thesis. He will probably be able to submit the thesis to Examiners by 1 October 1998. The work is on the late Choson diplomat, statesman, and patriot, Min Yong-hwan and is entitled: "Min Yong-hwan: A political biography with special reference to his diplomatic missions to Europe (1896 and 1897)". Ms. Grace Koh has been accepted to begin a D.Phil. degree in Korean Literature from 1998-1999, and she has been recommended for a Korea Foundation scholarship. She intends to examine certain literary aspects of the *Samguk Yusa*. Mr. Yeong-il Ha was admitted to the Faculty of Modern History as a Probationer Research Student under the supervision of Dr. James Lewis and Dr. James Hoare (Foreign and Commonwealth Office). Mr. Ha is preparing a doctoral thesis on the topic of British policy toward Korea, 1885-1905.

Undergraduate Programme:

We have had undergraduates come to us for some years to study modern Korean language or to prepare undergraduate theses on topics in Korean history, but from 1996 we have had two undergraduates preparing for written examinations in Korean history within the Honour School in Chinese. They were the first to read for a new course in the Chinese curriculum entitled: 'Korean History in Chinese'. Since we read Korean classical literature and documents in classical Chinese, the teachers of Chinese were pleased that their students could practice classical Chinese reading skills. Both students graduated in June 1998, having done rather well on their Korean history papers; in fact, the teachers of Chinese complained that these students seemed to be unprepared for other classes while favouring Korean.

Undergraduate enrollment in Korean language courses has remained unusually high, numbering twelve over the past year, with five students sitting final examinations in Korean language in the Final Honour School. Mr. Young-hae Choi's classes in Korean language remain popular among undergraduates in Chinese and Japanese.

Public Lectures/Seminars/Conferences:

Although our public lecture series was not very robust in 1997-1998, we were able to enjoy two very good lectures by distinguished guests. In addition, Oxford had the honour of serving as the venue for the 10th Biennial Meeting of the British Association for Korean Studies in April 1998.

The British Association for Korean Studies 10th Biennial Meeting was held at Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford, from 7 to 8 April, 1998. The theme of the Meeting was: "Leadership Transition in North and South Korea and the Significance for the Region". Professor Dae-Sook Suh, internationally known expert on the political history of North Korea and author of several books on North Korea, delivered the keynote address, followed by a Round-Table Discussion by UK experts on Korea (Dr. Barry Gillis of The University of Newcastle upon Tyne), China (Mr. John Gittings, Foreign Leader Writer for the *Guardian* newspaper), and Japan (Dr. Lesley Connors of SOAS, The University of London).

Scholarships:

Due to the generous support of the Korea Foundation, Oxford continues to offer scholarships for postgraduate degrees in Korean Studies. One award, which will be available for a student from a European Union country, meets the cost of University and college tuition fees but does not cover living expenses. As mentioned above, Mr. Andrew Pratt of SOAS was the recipient for 1997-1998. The other award, for a student from any country outside the European Union, meets the cost of the University and college tuition

fees and provides a grant towards living expenses. Mr. Takaaki Hara (M.Phil. in Comparative Linguistics) was the recipient for 1997-1998. Ms. Grace Koh has been recommended to the Korea Foundation for this scholarship for 1998-2001.

Priority is usually given to candidates wishing to study for a Master of Studies or Doctor of Philosophy degree in Korean language and history or classical literature in the Faculty of Oriental Studies. Candidates wishing to study in the areas of economics, politics, anthropology, linguistics, or sociology may also be considered. The awards are for one year in the first instance but, subject to satisfactory progress, may be renewed for up to two further years, depending on the duration of the degree course for which the student is registered.

The closing date for scholarship applications is 1 March annually. It is expected that the decision on the award of the scholarship will be announced by the end of March and recommendations made to the Korea Foundation. For further information and a scholarship application form please contact:

University of Sheffield, Sheffield

General:

On 20 September, 1997, the Centre for Korean Studies hosted a one-day colloquium on "Roman Catholic Missions in East Asia: From the 18th Century to Contemporary Times". The papers and discussion largely focussed on the work of the Paris Missionary Society. Paper presenters included Fr. Antonio Ucerier (Oxford), "Current Research on Alissandro Balignano (1539-1606)", Dr. Andrew Finch (Sheffield), "Characteristics of Early Korean Catholicism", Dr. Patrick Tuc (Liverpool), "Proselytism, Cultural Resistance, and Colonial Power: The Missions Etrangères de Paris in Vietnam, 1858-1914"; and Dr. John Bray, "Roman Catholic Missionaries and Tibet: A Historical Review".

For the fourth consecutive year, the Centre for Korean Studies and the Department of Music at the University hosted the Korean Culture Programme sponsored by the Korea Foundation. The Programme was held for two consecutive hours on 14 October, 1997 in the Firth Hall. Approximately 300 people attended the event, among whom was the Lord Mayor of Sheffield. A lecture on "Understanding Korean Music" preceded the concert. The concert contained examples of *kagok* vocal pieces and the folk song 'Arirang' and instrumental pieces illustrating the *komun-go* and *kaya-gum* zithers, the *taegum* reed pipe and samples of farmers' band music. Prof. Hwang Byung-ki, who was supposed to present the introductory lecture, was unable to attend due to a sudden illness. Instead, Dr. Keith Howard of the Centre for Korean Studies, School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London gave a lecture providing a general background on Korean music and the instruments played in the concert. The artists were Kim Chung-soo (chang-gu), Hwang Kyu-il (tagum), Cheong Dae-seog (komun-go), Won Il (p'iri and t'aep'yong-so), and Kang Kwon-soon (vocal artist).

For three days from 12 to 14 December, 1997, the Centre for Korean Studies hosted a symposium on the translation into English of modern Korean literature sponsored by the Korean Culture and Arts Foundation. Entitled 'Global Society and East Asian Literature: "The Translation and Promotion of Modern Korean Literature", the symposium examined the problems of the translation and promotion of modern and contemporary Korean literature placed

in the broader context of the modern literatures of East Asia. The symposium was held in the Mappin Hall and was attended by 75 people. The keynote lecture was given by Dr. Edward W. Poitras (emeritus, Southern Methodist University, Dallas) and entitled "The Road Taken and the Road Ahead: The Translator's Journey". Other presenters at the symposium were Dr. David R. McCann (Harvard University), "Transcendence in Modern Korean Literature", Bruce and Juchan Fulton, "Translators' Choice: Why We Translate Hwang Sun-won and O Chong-hui"; Dr. Kevin O'Rourke (Kyonghui University), "Modern Korean Poetry: Translation and the Tradition"; and Brother Anthony of Taizé (Sogang University), "Poetic Diversities: Social Dimensions of Korean Poetry". Comparative papers were given by Prof. Bonnie S. McDougall (University of Edinburgh), "Creative Tensions in Contemporary Chinese Fiction and Poetry", and Dr. Stephen Dodd (SOAS, London), "The Politics of Japanese Literary Translations". Commentators on the papers included Dr. Hilary Chung (Centre for Chinese Studies, University of Sheffield), Dr. Stephen Dodd, Dr. Oliver Kramer (Eton College), Dr. Thomas McAuley (Centre for Japanese Studies, University of Sheffield), Dr. David R. McCann, Prof. Bonnie McDougall, Mrs Genell Y. Poitras, Dr. Edward W. Poitras, Dr. Irena Powell (Centre for Japanese Studies, University of Sheffield), Dr. Agnita Tennant (Centre for Korean Studies, University of Sheffield), and Prof. Yi T'aedong (Sogang University). The symposium concluded with a plenary session on the problems of translating and promoting East Asian literatures. The British poet Jon Silkin was to have led the discussions of the plenary session but died before the symposium opened. The symposium opened with a remembrance of his work and was dedicated to him. The conference papers will be published as a volume of proceedings in early 1999.

Dr. Kenneth M. Wells of the Australian National University, on sabbatical leave at the Leiden University, gave a University Lecture on 13 May, 1998 entitled "Korean Responses to Imperialism: Providence versus World Systems Theory". Held in the Tapestry Room, approximately 60 persons attended. On the following day, Dr. Wells spoke to students doing the first year module on Korean history on the subject of Korean nationalists during the Japanese colonial period.

Centre for Korean Studies

Activities of individual scholars :

Dr. James H. Grayson contributed to the teaching of the first year module "The Transformation of East Asia", and taught the first year modules "History of Korea" and "Religion and Society in East Asia", and the upper level modules "The Philosophical Traditions of East Asia" and "The Traditional Culture of Korea".

Dr. Grayson's book manuscript, *Myths and Legends from Korea* was submitted to Sheffield Academic Press and is scheduled to be published in November, 1998.

He presented a paper at the three-day conference "Christianity in Korea" held from 25 to 27 September, 1997 in New York. Hosted by Union Theological Seminary, the conference was sponsored by the Korea Society. The paper was entitled "Cultural Encounter: The Impact of Korean Protestantism on the Other Religious Traditions". He read a paper at the second annual "Colloquium on Christian Missions in Asia" hosted by the Department of History, the University of Liverpool on 16 July, 1998. The colloquium considered Christian martyrdom in East Asia from the sixteenth to twentieth centuries. The presentation was entitled "The Shinto Shrine Controversy and Protestant Martyrs in Korea: an Underexamined Case of East Asian Martyrdom, 1938-1945".

Dr. Grayson was co-organiser of the symposium "Global Society and East Asian Literature" held in December, 1997 at Sheffield. Since January, 1998, he has been Secretary of the British Association for Korean Studies.

Dr. Young-doo Cho continued to teach the upper level undergraduate modules "Economic Development of Korea" and "Korean Management", and to contribute to the teaching of "The Political Economy of East Asia". In the summer of 1997, he organised the ninth annual Korea-Britain Conference jointly hosted with Yonsei University on the topic of "East Asian Globalisation". He attended various conferences including the 1998 annual conference of the Royal Economic Society.

The teaching staff of the Centre was augmented by the arrival of Dr. Agnita Tenant (Hong Myong-hui), translator of the modern Korean novel saga, *Land*. Dr. Tenant has introduced two one-semester upper level modules "Modern Korean Literature" and "Contemporary Korean Literature". The content of these modules emphasises the cultural and historical context of the literary works discussed. Dr. Tenant was co-organiser of the symposium "Global Society and East Asian Literature" hosted at Sheffield in December, 1997.

Ms. Hyang-jin Lee continued to co-ordinate the teaching of the Korean language programme and to teach Korean language at all levels with the assistance of three part-time instructors. She also taught the upper level module "Contemporary Korean Society". She submitted the manuscript of her doctoral dissertation on the sociological aspects of Korean cinema to the University of Leeds in the early summer, 1998 and expects to take her *viva voce* examination in September, 1998.

Ms. Judith Cherry, KPMG Research Fellow in Korean-European Relations, continued her research on Korean inward investment in Britain which is part of the Korea Foundation's Korea-Europe Project. She continued to teach grammar and reading unseen Korean texts to first and second level students and again contributed to the teaching of the post-graduate module "Essentials of Korean Management". Ms. Cherry was appointed Acting Chairman of the Korea Trade Action Committee of the British Overseas Trade Board and continued as a

member of the Partnership Korea Advisory Group. During the visit of President Kim Daejung to Britain in April, 1998, she was invited to attend a lunch given in his honour.

Dr. Andrew Finch, Junior Research Fellow of the East Asian Research Centre, has been in Japan during the last academic session collecting material for his research on the work of the Paris Missionary Society in Japan and Korea. He presented a paper entitled "The Image of the Martyr in Early Nineteenth Century Korea" to the second annual "Colloquium on Christian Missions in Asia" held on 16 July, 1998 at the University of Liverpool.

Mr. Kim Young-seok, Korean Studies Librarian and Information Officer, has now completed his three-year contractual period with support from the Korea Foundation. During that time, Mr. Kim has completed the cataloguing of all vernacular monograph materials and placed all these bibliographical records on a stand-alone electronic database. He has also created an up-to-date serials list at Sheffield.

Dr. Kim Kwan-soo of the College of Commerce of Kyongnam University in Masan has spent the past academic session as a visiting scholar. Dr. Kim is a specialist in marine transportation and has spent the year investigating British and Dutch marine transport and harbour facilities.

Report of the academic programme of study:

The University of Sheffield and Kyongsang National University in Chinju established a sister relationship during the academic session 1996/7. Sheffield students going to Chinju are students who are doing the dual honours programme in Japanese and Korean Studies. They will receive 20 hours of language tuition for ten weeks at the College of Education of the University and will also be assigned cultural and historic project work to do during their time in Korea. The teachers for this intensive programme have been trained at Yonsei University and the curriculum will follow the Yonsei curriculum. Students doing any other Korean Studies degree programme at Sheffield will continue to spend a full academic session at the Korean Language Institute of Yonsei University.

During the academic session 1997/98, there were 6 undergraduate students doing the degree programme Single Honours Korean Studies, 12 students doing the degree programme Dual Honours Japanese and Korean Studies, and one student doing the degree programme Business Studies and Korean Studies. Overall, 25 students studied Korean language and 175 students studied Korean Studies modules or Korea-related modules.

Giuseppe Tribuno, a Level One Plus (second year of a four-year programme) student doing the degree programme Dual Honours Japanese and Korean Studies, received the Sir Basil Blackwell Prize for achieving the highest academic record during the past session of any student in the Faculty of Social

Sciences. This is the third consecutive year that a student from the School of East Asian Studies has received this prize.

Three Level Two (third year) students doing the Japanese and Korean Studies degree programme spent three months from January to March, 1998 at Kyongsang National University receiving intensive language training before going on to Japan to receive intensive tuition in Japanese.

For the session 1997/98, there were ten post-graduate research students in the School of East Asian Studies doing research on a Korea-related topic. Kim Songsu has submitted his thesis on the life and work of Han Sökhön and will defend it in a *viva voce* examination in September. Richard Watson, doing research on the Korean school system, will spend the academic session 1998/99 in Korea teaching in a high school in Ch'ungnam Province.

From the academic session 1998/99, the Centre for Korean Studies will offer an MA degree programme in Modern Korean Studies. The programme consists of a one-third element of language study, training in research methods, and the study of modules on a variety of cognitive subjects. It is possible for the student to do a few generic modules in East Asian Studies. The programme has been arranged so that the student could tailor the degree towards a business and economics, a society and culture, or language and linguistics emphasis.

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Activities of individual scholars :

Dr. Károly Fendler, associate professor at the Institute for Oriental Communication and Further Training (IOCFT), Korean Section taught a course on Korean history during the academic year 1997-98, at the "Eötvös Loránd" University, Budapest, College for Foreign Trade.

Dr. Fendler gave two lectures on South Korea's economic development and on the Korean question for the management course at the College for Foreign Trade.

Mr. Gábor Osváth, senior lecturer at the IOCFT read a paper on the "Relationship between the Language and Thinking in Korea" at the Annual Conference of Applied Linguistics in Budapest (April 1996). At the 1997 edition of the same conference (Szombathely, April 1997) he presented a paper on the "Language Divergence between North and South Korea. At the ICANAS conference (July 1997) he read a paper entitled "The Adaptation of English Loanwords in Korean".

In March 1997 Mr Osváth gave a lecture on the problems of cross-cultural communication in the case of Korea to the students of the Business Communication Faculty at the College for Foreign Trade.

The academic session 1997-98 welcomed 18 students at the College for Foreign Trade who took courses in Korean language, history and economics. Ms. Orsolya KISS, a 1998 graduate, received a one-year Korean government scholarship to study in Korea in 1998-99.

Mr. Tibor BALOGH, a 1992 graduate, continues his postgraduate studies (politology) in Korea on a ROK government scholarship.

THE NETHERLANDS

Leiden University, Centre for Korean Studies

Concluding a stay of 11 months in Leiden, Dr. Kenneth M. Wells of Australian National University in Canberra returned home in June 1998. Joining forces with Boudewijn Walraven and Koen De Ceuster, he worked on a joint research project on "Religion and social change in colonial Korea", of which the first results will be presented during the 1999 AAS Conference in Boston. Joined by Professor Park Myoung-Kyu (SNU), the three project participants will read papers in their panel on "Aspects of Religious Social Thought in Colonial Korea". While in The Netherlands, Ken Wells presented the following lectures:

- "Notions of Providence, Civilization, and Imperialism in early Korean Protestant Thought", presented at the East Asian Religion Seminar Group, Leiden University, November 1997.
- "North Korea's Religious Policy: An Exploration", presented to the Oosters Genootschap in Nederland, Leiden, November 1997.
- "The Price of Legitimacy: the Korean Women's Kumuhoe Movement", IIAS, May 1998.

In March, Jong Koe Paik (Paek Chong-gu) was awarded a doctorate for his thesis *Constructing Christian Faith in Korea: the Earliest Protestant Mission and Ch'oe Pyöng-höñ*. His supervisors were W.J. Boot and B.C.A. Walraven. At the AAS conference in Washington D.C. in March 1998, Boudewijn Walraven read a paper "Popular or Private: Shamanic or Heterodox Rituals in Chosön Korea," participating in a panel on "Public and Private in Choson Korea," organized by Jabyun Kim Haboush.

On October 17, 1998 Boudewijn Walraven presented a paper entitled "Chicken or Egg: Social Values and Korean Religions" during an international symposium "Social Norms and Traditional Religions," organized by the research cluster "Words and Values" of Leiden University.

Koen De Ceuster read a paper on "Korean Economic Development. The relevance of a historical approach" during the first session of the Asian Development Seminar Series (ADSS). Established late in 1997, the ADSS intends to bring together scholars from various disciplines and regional backgrounds to discuss different aspects of Asia's development process. The initiative comes from a core group of Asia specialists at Leiden University, but from the start wanted to involve interested scholars from all over the Netherlands. Funding has been secured to publish a working paper series. Koen De Ceuster is both a member of the core group of organizers and will also serve as co-editor for the working paper series.

On March 10, 1998, Koen De Ceuster talked to the "Kring van Leidse Urbanisten" about "National Icons in the Seoul Landscape". On October 29, He will give a guest-lecture at the University of Amsterdam on "State and Society in Contemporary Korea".

Recovering from an operation, Koen De Ceuster was forced to postpone his research stay in Korea until later in the year. He is scheduled to leave for Korea on a KF research fellowship on November 1, in order to look into the YMCA's rural revitalization programme during the colonial period.

After working for nearly 25 years as a language teacher within the Korean Studies programme Soon-ja Lamers-Shin retired in September 1998. Her place was taken by Myoung-suk Chi, who at the same time, with support from the Korea Foundation, continues work on the new course "Business Korean I & II", which was instituted in 1997.

In October 1998, Mr Remco Breuker (drs. in Korean and Japanese studies) left for Korea on a Korean government scholarship to prepare a PhD in Korean history.

On 4th November 1997 the Faculty of Polish Philology of Warsaw University conferred R. Huszcza the Dr.Hab. title for his Habilitationschrift "Honoryfikatywnosc. Gramatyka-pragmatyka-typologia" (Honorifics. Grammar - Pragmatics - Typology) published in Warsaw by DIALOG Academic Press (1996). His book compares from a general linguistic perspective the honorifics in Polish and Indo-European languages with those in Japanese, Korean and Vietnamese.

Currently R. Huszcza is a visiting researcher at the Department of Linguistics, University of Tokyo, Japan as a Japan Foundation fellow, working on his book on East-Asian linguistic polysystemism and co-systemism.

Halina Ogarek-Czaj, Ph.D. took part in the Symposium on 50 years of the Contemporary Korean Literature, 21-22 September 1995 organised by the Daesan Foundation in Seoul. She spoke about the prospects of Korean literature in times of unification. Dr. Ogarek-Czaj also participated in the 3rd International Symposium on East Asia, organised in Seoul by Kyonggi University, September 1996. She presented a paper on Korean Studies in Poland. Furthermore, she attended the Congress of Overseas Ethnic Korean Writers in Seoul, 2-6 October 1996 (together with her daughter Anna Korwin-Kowalewska - author of the novel "Married to a Ghost").

Dr. Halina Ogarek-Czaj was awarded the "Munhwa p'ojang" by the President of the Republic of Korea in October 1996 for her service to Korean Studies.

Christoph Janasiak, M.A. stayed in Seoul from June 1997 until February 1998 on a Korea Foundation Fellowship doing research on the beginning of the Korean Press. He attended the 7th International Conference of IAKLE at the Yonsei University (6-7 September 1997) and took part in the International Conference on Literacy and Hangul organised by the Ministry of Culture and Sports at the Sejong Cultural Centre, 8-9 September 1997. Together with Ms Anna Paradowska, Mr. Janasiak also attended the first Seoul International Conference on Phonetic Sciences organised by the Phonetic Society of Korea, 24-26 October 1997.

Ms Agnieszka Zulawska-Umeda, M.A. took part in the International Conference on the Translation of Korean Literature organised by Daesan Foundation and the Institute of Translation, Yonsei University, (7-8 November 1996) where she presented a paper on the translation of poetry in connection with the completion of the translation (together with Choi Gunn-Young, Ph.D.) into Polish of an Anthology of Korean Poetry.

Reports of the academic programme :

Since the 1996/97 academic year, Christoph Janasiak, M.A., teaches at the Korean Section, Warsaw University, Oriental Institute, as a senior lecturer, thanks to financial support received from the Korea Foundation.

During the 1997/98 academic year, sponsoring by Korea Foundation paid for the salary of three staff members in the Korean Section: Christoph Janasiak, M.A., Ahn Hae-kyun, M.A., and Anna Wojakowska-Kurowska, M.A. KF support continues in the 1989/99 academic year, and hopefully also in the two following years.

In August 1996, Korea Research Foundation sent prof. Jeong Jeong Deok, professor of Changwon University, to Warsaw University as a visiting professor for two years. He returned to Korea in August 1998.

Since the 1997/98 academic year, the Polish teaching staff of the Korean Section was augmented with the coming of Michał Piskorski, M.A., M.Sc., who teaches computer processing and Korean conversation in the Language Laboratory. At the same time, Choi Sung-eun, M.A., became part-time lecturer as native speaker at the Korean section.

During the summer semester of the 1997/98 academic year, the Korean Section obtained an up-to-date multimedia Korean Language Laboratory donated to Warsaw University by Samsung Electronics Co, Ltd. Samsung Electronics donated also valuable materials to be used in the Language Laboratory and promised to provide a four year scholarship for a graduate of the Korean Section to study computer processing of Korean-Polish texts.

Scholarships for students of Korean Section:

- Ms Ewa Rynarzewska stayed in Seoul during the 1995/96 academic year as a recipient of the Korean Arts And Culture Foundation fellowship for young translators;
- Mr Stanisław Matsumoto attended a Korean Language Course from March until September 1996 as recipient of the Korea Foundation (KF) Fellowship;
- Mr Michał Piskorski attended a Korean Language Course from September 1996 until March 1997 as recipient of a KF Fellowship;
- Ms Małgorzata Zgirska attended the Korean Language Course at Korea University from August to December 1996;
- Ms Joanna Hosaniak and Ms Małgorzata Grzybowska studied at the Yonsei University from September until December 1996, where they attended the Korean Language Course;
- Three of our students: Ms Dagmara Soliwoda, Ms Agnieszka Rytych and Ms Bogumiła Jankiewicz studied at Korea University from April to September 1997 as recipients of a KF Korean Language Fellowship.
- Ms Anna Tkaczyk and Ms Edyta Matejko are staying at Yonsei University from March to December 1998 as recipients of the KF Korean Language Fellowship.
- Ms Małgorzata Mietek will be in Seoul from August 1998 to August 2000 on a Samsung Electronics scholarship. She will enroll in the Master's Degree Program in Korean Studies at the Graduate School of International Studies, Korea University.
- Actually three of our graduates are studying in Korea on ROK government scholarships: Ms Anna Paradowska, M.A., (at Seoul University since August 1995), Ms Ewa Rynarzewska, M.A., (at Korea University since November 1996), and Małgorzata Zgirska, M.A., (at Korea University since August 1997).

On 17 February 1998, on the occasion of the opening ceremony of the Korean Language Laboratory, the Korean Session of the Oriental Institute

Council took place. Six members of the teaching staff of the Korean Section presented papers: Halina Ogarek-Czaj, Romuald Huszcza, Jeong Jeong Deok, Joanna Ruratz, Anna Wojakowska-Kurowska, Michał Piskorski, and one graduate student Ms Katarzyna Lachowicz.

Thanks to financial support for the expansion and enhancement of the Korean Studies Programme in Warsaw University by the Korea Foundation and the Embassy of the Republic of Korea in Poland nearly every year new students could be enrolled and Korean (in two levels) be taught to students from other sections of the Oriental Institute. In the 1997/98 academic year there were 45 students at the Korean Section (in their 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 5th years of study) and eleven teaching staff (including 5 native speakers), of whom four as a part-time lecturer.

Other activities relating to Korean Studies :

In October 1995 Jan Fontein presented "Survival Against All Odds", a lecture and Performance program (altogether 100 min) on Ancient Korean Cultural Treasures at Warsaw University (organised by the ROK Embassy and sponsored by Korea Foundation).

At the "Studio" Gallery in Warsaw an exhibition of Contemporary Korean Art was held from 20 October till 9 November 1997, organised and sponsored by the ROK Embassy, Korea Foundation, the Korea Fine Arts Association, and the Polish Ministry of Culture and Fine Arts;

During three weeks of August 1997 the Polish Radio One broadcast short-stories by Han Malsuk in translation by Halina Ogarek-Czoj

On 18-19 November 1997, Korean Culture Days were organised in the Art Highschools in Kielce. A lecture on Korean history was given by Michał Piskorski, M.A., M.Sc.

On 26th June 1998 Daewoo Poland organised a presentation of Korean costumes by Lee Young Hee at the Marriott Hotel.

- A competition was organised (in 1997 and 1998 in Warsaw's 19th Highschool, which also carries the name of King Sejong the Great, on student's knowledge about Korea. Michał Piskorski M.A., M.Sc gave lectures on Korean language, history and culture.

A new Polish-Korean Society was established in Warsaw in 1997. In 1998 it inaugurated the Korean Club in association with the "Feniks" Foundation.
